SCHOOL REPORT.

Table with columns: Name, Age, School, etc. for the year 1891-2.

The total enrollment for the year
has been 430, or 47 more than last year.
The average attendance per teacher
has been 32.

All grades below the high school are
"up to grade" in their work, so that
hereafter pupils promoted to the high
school should be able to do the higher
work, having passed in Eng. grammar,
geography, arithmetic and U. S. history.

As the state high school board has
lately advanced the requirements for
admission to high schools about one
half a year's work, a few from the A
Grammar will enter the high school on
"condition" in a part of their work.

This back work should be made up by
the time of the first state examination.
Pupils in the high school will be able
to complete the full amount of work
outlined for the several grades if a
proper effort is made.

REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.
