FROM THE COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT.

A few words from this office at this time will, I think, be in order. I am very sorry to state that mud and bridgeless streams prevented me from reaching all the schools before they closed.

As I visited the various schools, I was extremely gratified to note that the series of teachers' meetings held last year were fruitful of good results. I saw many of the points made and suggestions offered at these meetings, put in practice in the school room. We hope to begin another series of these meetings soon after the fall institute.

I found that some of the school boards acted upon the suggestion I made last year with reference to black boards and dictionaries. Black boards and dictionaries first, and then if you have any loose money, put in a limited supply of good maps and charts, and before you invest very much money in this line of goods, consult the Superintendent, or some other person who ought to know what is needed in a school room.

It seems to be the rule in this county to change teachers every term, regardless of their ability, experience, or service rendered. This is a mistake, and one which will block the way to the building of our school, if not remedied. Good teachers should not be changed to suit some impudent boy or girl, or satisfy the whim of some unreasonable or cranky parent, which is often the case.

The appearance of some of the school houses, both inside and outside, show neglect on the part of those whose duty it is to look after such matters. As I hauled my rig up to these buildings, I could not help but feel that the enthusiasm which should pervade the district for the success and good results of the school was, if not dead, sleeping. Make your school rooms pleasant, inviting and wholesome. Curtain the windows, and adorn well whitewashed walls with a few suggestive pictures. Teachers might do a great deal in this direction if they would only try.

In many cases I found the out houses nothing more or less than vile holes of infamy. Dirty, filthy and covered with hieroglyphs from the infernal regions. School boards and teachers alike are to blame for these festering spawn beds of vice. I do not approve of the double building. Two separate buildings should be erected on every school ground, and if the teachers do not see that they are used in conformity with decency and modesty they are unworthy of the name of teacher. There is room for missionary work in this direction, and a man who has studied the habits and temptations of school children, I send out this warning cry with the sincere hope that it will be heeded.

Last year I experienced some trouble in getting reports from some of the clerks, which I hope will be avoided this year. Blanks have been sent out, and I shall look for a prompt and accurate report. There is a clause in the school law which says that every clerk must notify the county superintendent when a school begins. If this part of the law had been complied

GOOD ROADS.

CHAPTER XVII.

A bill was introduced one day in the Legislature at Albany to provide for the construction of improved roads in the state of New York. It was proposed that the main roads should be constructed and kept in repair by a general state tax; that a non-partisan commission should be appointed to supervise the laying out of these roads.

Some of the opposition to that bill came from farmers who said that they were opposed to having the public money spent by commission. It was a foolish objection. You will pardon me if I say that the farmer is not the only honest man in the world. No man has a monopoly of virtue. Every dollar of thousands of millions collected by the United States Government, is collected by a public officer or a commission-gone every penny of the thousands of millions of dollars spent for government uses is spent by a public servant of some kind. Honesty is more prevalent than it used to be; there is less stealing in high places. Every administration for the last fifty years has improved upon the one which preceded it in the handling of public money. The population has been growing bigger; public methods have been systematized; the duties of public officers made more exacting and the number of defalcations is so small as to be hardly worth considering. The political parties are watching each other and are ever on the alert to find something wrong in each other's camp.
