SENATOR C. K. DAVIS WILL SPEAK.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

To be voted upon at the next General Election. (Published in Pursuance of Chapter 157, General Laws of 1887.)

WHEREAS, It is made the duty by law of the Attorney General to prepare a synopsis of all amendments proposed to the constitution, and it is hereby given that the following amendments are submitted to the voters of the State of Minnesota, to be voted upon at the general election to be held in the year 1892.

The following amendment to Section 31 of the constitution of the State of Minnesota is hereby proposed, which shall have effect unless otherwise provided by law.

Section 31 of Article IV of the constitution of the State of Minnesota is hereby amended so that the words "and the voters" shall be inserted after the word "and" in the first line of said section.

Section 32 of Article IV of the constitution of the State of Minnesota is hereby amended so that the words "and the voters" shall be inserted after the word "and" in the first line of said section.
