The State Finan The report of the state auditor for the

fiscal years ending July 31, 1891, and July 31, 1892, have been completed and will be submitted to the legislature next January. It commences with a table howing the estimated receipts and disursements for the fiscal years of 1893, 1894 and 1895, as follows:

Receipts-1893, \$3,821,078.58; 1894, \$2, 84, 138.07; 1895, \$2,881, 188.07. Disbursements - 1893, \$2,761,940.46

Auditor Bierman recommends that uthority be given to cancel the loans of 1877 and 1878, for the reason that they will never be collected.

Regarding revenue laws, the only suggestion of importance made regarding the assessment and collection of taxes is with reference to the system of township assessors.
