Improvement Association Meeting.

A meeting of the Improvement Association was held at G. A. R. hall March 10, 1894. In the absence of Pres. McCune and Vice-Pres. Manning, L. B. Bennett called the meeting to order. E. F. Buchan was chosen Secretary pro tem. Mr. Day made a report for committee on parks and boulevards, that the right of way around West Okabons Lake was secured with the exception of about a quarter of a mile across the Alexander tract. They believe that the road might be opened this season and recommended that the grade across the upper end be made narrow at the present time. Committee have taken steps to secure pond-lily roots for planting at the upper end of the lake. Report accepted. Secretary read a letter from W. P. Alsip, of Grand Forks, N. D. regarding the opening of a brick yard here. The matter was referred to committee on Manufactures, D. Shell, chairman. Moved and carried to adjourn.

State Convention.

Congressman Fletcher: "By Sept. 1. when the campaign should open there will not be enough democrats in Minnesota to hold conventions."

Senator Washburn: Congress will not adjourn before August, and a short, decisive campaign is all that is required to assure a complete Republican victory.

Congressman Tawney: Minnesota will be so completely Republican that there will be no occasion to hire a band or buy a torch to pile up a monstrous majority for Republicans.

Congressman Kiefer: "I think people prefer to have a short campaign especially now that the issue between the parties is so clearly drawn, and everybody already knows how he is going to vote."

Congressman McCleary: "I think a state convention about the first or middle of September and a congressional convention a week earlier, will give me all the time I want to explain my action and votes in congress. If the Republicans of the second district renominate me I have no doubt as to the result."

The following proposition was offered by Peter Thompson.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Nobles County, Minnesota.

Gentlemen:—I hereby submit the following proposition for your consideration, as basis of settlement and for continuation of the case brought on behalf of the county against the bondsmen of the Nobles County Bank as the depository of county funds; I will pay into the County Treasury the sum of \$5,000 as soon as the assignee is released, and the assets, including the money on hand, are returned to and turned back to me, by order of the court; that I will pay a further

sum of \$5,000 every six months thereafter until the entire obligation to the county is fully paid.

In consideration of which payments the county to continue the said case against said bondsmen from term to term, with the consent of all parties concerned.

On reading the above proposition, the following motion prevailed, to-wit:

That we, the board of County Commissioners of Nobles County, Minnesota, do hereby except the above proposition of Peter Thompson with the following modifications:

That he, Peter Thompson, shall pay or cause to be paid into the county treasury of said county of Nobles, the sum of \$10,000.00 within five days from this date, and that a further payment of \$5,000 shall be made on or before the first day of Nov., 1894, and shall pay the sum of \$5,000 at the end of each six months thereafter, until the amount of the liability of said Peter Thompson to the county of Nobles shall be fully paid.

Also, that the bondsmen of said Peter Thompson shall sign a bond, whereby they shall give their consent

to this agreement, and be responsible for its faithful performance.
