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



STATE EXAMINATIONS.

The second State Examination for 1894 will be given at the High School Building, Worthington, Minnesota, according to the program given below. To those who pass these examinations certificates are issued by the State High School Board, which permit the holder to enter the State University, any of the colleges of the state, or any of the State Normals without further examination in the specified branch. Any that wish may take these examinations, whether enrolled in our own school or not, provided they have studied the entire subject covered by the examination they wish. An occurrence at a previous examination suggests that the following point be announced: we do not intend to give examinations to those who have been dishonorably dismissed during the current school year, either from our school or from other schools.

There are a number of young people in Worthington who are not in school, who could take some of these examinations successfully; this is probably true also of many pupils in the country schools or those of neighboring villages. There may be district-school teachers who would like to try; County Supt. Maguire says he will consider the certificates gained from the State Examinations in granting Teachers' Certificates. Last February quite a number of those outside our enrollment took these examinations and secured State Certificates.

Knox 140, who not only sired a large family of performers, but who got among others the fast mare Lady Maud, 2:18½, that produced the world beating colt Monbars 2:16½, as a two-year old, and 2:11½ as a three-year old. Goldendale's pedigree will thus be seen strong and symmetrical at all points, well qualifying him to sustain the reputation of his illustrious ancestors.

GAYO, 7502, dapple Bay, 16½ hands high, weight 1300 pounds. This Royal Bred Colt when 3 years old won a race in 2:38 without much training. His large size and stately appearance should make his services in great demand with those who wish to breed Gentlemen's Drivers and Fancy Matched Teams, and need only be seen to be appreciated.

ROM 14358, bright bay 16 hands high, weighs 1200 pounds, is bred from speed producing lines from both sire and dam as an examination of his pedigree will show.
