Republican State Convention.

A republican convention for the state of Minnesota will be held on Wednesday, the 11th day of July, 1894, in the auditorium, in the city of St. Paul, at 10 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following offices: Governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, attorney general, clerk of the supreme court, chief justice of the supreme court, and one associate justice of the supreme court, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the convention.

All voters who believe in the principles advocated by the republican party and who desire its success, regardless of their past political affiliations, are heartily invited to participate in the selection of delegates to this convention. The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the committee:

Resolved, That each county shall be entitled to one delegate for each two hundred votes or major fraction thereof cast for the republican candidate for president in 1892, and that each county be allowed in addition five delegates at large.

In accordance with the above resolution, the several counties are entitled to representation in the convention as follows:
