Nobles County Democracy Meets at G. A. R. Hall.

AND NOMINATES A TICKET

Nearly all by Acclamation—The Tug of War on Sheriff.

Democrats to the number of 63 assembled at G. A. R. hall Tuesday to nominate a county ticket.

Cardinal Randolph Schultz, of the county central committee, called the convention to order at the appointed hour. On motion Doctor Butts Dolan was elected temporary chairman, and Mr. Diehn, of Round Lake, was elected secretary.

Fleance King, son of Banquo, chairman of the ways and means committee, introduced the following resolutions, which were received with vociferous applause:

We, the democrats of Nobles county, in convention assembled, do declare our renewed allegiance to the principles of true democracy as personified in the official acts of Thos Jefferson, Andrew Jackson, Samuel J. Tilden and Grover Cleveland. [Applause] [Greek fire.]

We reaffirm the declarations of the Chicago platform of 1892 and believe that the masses of our people will never be freed from the oppression of the classes, until the flag of free trade floats supreme to the winds of popular opinion. [Great applause.]

We believe that the republican system of taxing the many for the enrichment of the few is responsible for the financial clouds which in the recent past have temporarily obscured the sun of prosperity. [Applause]

We congratulate the country, that through the agency of democratic legislation [Manning fell into the cellar] the trials and tribulations of the business world are at an end. [Schultz fans himself vigorously] and urge upon every individual democrat the necessity of using their vote and voice toward the perpetuation of the party of the people—the party of reform, the grand old democratic party, [The roof raised.]

We endorse the wisdom of the state convention in the selection for governor of that old war horse of Democracy, Geo. L. Becker, of St. Paul, and cordially endorse the pledge our allegiance to the state platform.

We approve of the selection of Gen. J. H. Backer, for congress. [You could have heard a gum drop] and urge every independent thinker and every enemy of republican misrule to vote for the gallant soldier and courageous democrat.

We condemn the American protective association, and every religio-political organization as unpatriotic and un-American, and enemies to our popular government.

We pledge the support of every delegate present at this convention, to the nominees today, and believe it is the foremost and paramount duty of every true and loyal democrat to use all honest efforts to secure their election. [Banquo's son sits down.]

An informal ballot was taken with this result:

Anderson 26
Murphy 26
Lagrange 4
Ryan 6

The next ballot showed 64 votes "out of a possible 62." The chair announced that ballot No. 2, would now be taken.

Anderson received 30, Murphy 26, Ryan 7.

Third ballot—Anderson 29, Murphy 27, Ryan 7.

Fourth ballot—Anderson 31, Murphy 25, Ryan 7.

Fifth ballot—Anderson 29, Murphy 28, Ryan 6.

Sixth ballot—Anderson 29, Murphy 29. Ryan having dropped out of the contest.

A recess was taken, and pandemonium broke loose. Finally partial quiet was restored and the seventh ballot was taken resulting in 32 votes for Anderson and 28 for Murphy. Some one made a motion to make Mr. Anderson's nomination; unanimous, and it was carried.

Senator Sherman in South Dakota. HOT SPRINGS, S. D., Sept. 13.—Senator John Sherman, General Nelson A. Miles and wife and son, and Dr. Daly and brother came in on President Marvin Hughtitt's special car over the Northwestern, and will spend a few days enjoying the bracing air and talking baths. The party has been hunting prairie chickens in Northern Nebraska.

Wants Chicago Taxes Raised. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Sept. 13.—W. K. Ackerman, city comptroller of Chicago, made an argument before the state board of equalization asking that \$50,000,000 be added to the Cook county assessment, so as to give Chicago \$1,000,000 more taxes. He said the saloons kept Chicago alive and no honest assessor could be elected.

A Successful Meeting. ABERDEEN, S. D., Sept. 13.—The annual state convention of the W. C. T. U., in session here for several days, closed Tuesday with an address by Mary A. Woodbridge. One hundred and twenty-five delegates have been in attendance. The entire session was a complete success.

The Fort Sheridan Shoot. CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—Preparations for the big army shoot at Fort Sheridan are almost complete and on Friday the men will begin banging away at the targets. The preliminary shoot, which is for the department of the Missouri, will extend from Sept. 14 to Sept. 27.

Big Increase in Earnings. TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 13.—The monthly statement of the receipts of the Northern Pacific for August will show an increase over the receipts of August, 1893. This will be the first time in 18 months that the comparative statements have shown an increase.

The Law Unconstitutional. BISMARCK, Sept. 13.—The supreme court decided the state drainage law unconstitutional. The test case was from Cass county, where \$30,000 of the bonds have been issued under the law. Pembina county is also interested to the extent of about \$10,000.
