### Don't Fail to Hear Him!

The St. Paul Globe says that J. J. Rider will represent Rock county in the next legislature. If he does it will be in the third house.

Congressman McCleary's speech on the financial question, at Pipestone Saturday night, was the cleanest, plainest, clearest cut solution of the question we have ever seen. The speech showed that it was prepared and delivered by one who had given the subject candid, careful study. It was the greatest speech ever delivered in the state on the money question, and it ought to be in the hands of every populist and democrat in the state.

A local democrat sarcastically remarked, last week, "that Maine had gone Republican." Yes, the old Pine Tree state has "gone Republican," and decidedly and emphatically, too. And all this in the face of the present administration, to which the late democratic county convention "pointed with pride." The majority given the republican candidate for governor exceeds the total vote of the democrats. Never in the history of the state has there been such a sweeping republican victory.

If there is anyone that need not worry over the result of the coming election, as regards himself personally, that man is Clerk of the Courts F. A. Stevens. He can win this fight with his hands tied behind him. The office of Clerk is one of much importance and it is highly essential that one who is familiar with the work should be kept in charge. Mr. Stevens is that man, he is one of the most faithful and competent officials the county ever had and the people will see to it that he is re-elected by a good big majority. By close attention to the duties of the position and accuracy in handling the affairs of the office Mr. Stevens has more than earned a re-election.

### Biermann Is Repudiated.

In connection with the matter of the nomination of Biermann the Crookston Times, W. E. McKenzie editor, a democratic paper, of good standing, says in its issue of Sept. 8: "With the exception of state auditor the balance of the ticket was made up of men worthy of respect and support, no matter on what ticket their names were placed. But the nomination of Biermann for state auditor is enough to condemn the whole ticket. It was an insult to every honest member of the democratic party and an outrage upon the people of the state. After the scandals in which he has been involved; after the almost positive evidence that he has been implicated in the extensive pine land steals recently exposed, and after his known disloyalty to his party, his name was allowed to come before the convention and he was actually nominated. And this, notwithstanding the fact that an honest, upright citizen and loyal democrat was pitted against him. In any other convention the proposer of his name would have been hissed from the hall, but here his name was received with cheers of applause. It was the most bare-faced and disgraceful thing a convention ever did, and it will be sure to react upon the party for years to come."
