CLAIMED AS SWAMP LANDS.

State of Minnesota Wants Part of the Famous "Sea 30."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—John C. Judge of Minneapolis, who was appointed attorney for the state by Auditor Dunn, has filed with the commissioner of the general land office an application for the selection by the state of an important tract of land in Lake county. The claim of the state is that several tracts in section 30, town 63, are swamp lands and that the state is entitled to them under the original swamp land law. The lands in question are said to be of great value, carrying, as is supposed, a large amount of valuable iron. The title of the land is still in the general government, but after several test cases and decisions by Secretaries Vilas, Noble and Smith, patents for the lands in question were shortly to be issued to various persons and companies that are understood to have acquired title through these decisions. So valuable are the lands that the title to them has been in contest for many years and claims to them were numerous.

Might Have Been Swamp Land.
Commissioner Lamoreaux said that the impression had been gained by the land officials here that the property is supposed to be worth approximately \$1,000,000. The action taken by the land officials of Minnesota through Attorney Judge will throw the matter back as to the settlement of the title for many years to come. Commissioner Lamoreaux said that according to the return of the surveyor general the lands were not listed as swamp, but, as is well known, the swamp land interests of Minnesota have been subject to various changes, and there is no reason known to the land officials here why it could not be established that these lands in Lake county were swamp at the time of the passage of the original swamp land act.

SLUGGED SHERIFF AND TURKEY

Wilmore County Officers Have a Great Time With an Insane Man.
PRESTON, Minn., Nov. 19.—Halvor Erickson of the town of Bristol, Fillmore county, was brought before Judge Farrington Saturday and adjudged insane. He was taken to jail until Monday when he was to be conveyed to Rochester. Sunday about 2 o'clock the turkey took dinner to the inmates of the jail and upon entering the room the insane man ordered the turkey to go into one of the cells, and on his refusing to do so the insane man commenced to throw cups, plates and, in fact, everything in his reach, and finally commenced a fist fight on the turkey.

PROTECTION THE KEYNOTE.

Speakers at the Home Market Club Banquet Loudly Applauded.
BOSTON, Nov. 22.—The Home Market club had its annual banquet at Music hall during the evening. Hon. H. Clay Evans of Tennessee, Hon. Charles Emory Smith of Philadelphia, ex-minister to Russia, and Hon. Warner Miller of New York made the principal speeches. American wages for American workmen and protection to the American market was the keynote of the remarks, and every mention of Thomas B. Reed or William McKinley called forth great applause. Covers were laid for 600 and the galleries were also crowded during the post prandial exercises.

IOWA MINERS HAVE SUCCEEDED

Leave the National Body and Form a New Organization.
OKMUNWA, Ia., Nov. 22.—The proceedings of the coal miners' convention here took an unexpected turn during the day and Mine Workers of America, District No. 18, broke away from the national organization and reorganized the entire state under the name of the Iowa Mine Workers' Protective association, leaving out of the district the Missouri miners formerly attached. The new organization will have a benevolent fund attachment, providing for sick benefit and death benefit, and will affiliate with the Mine Workers of America and the American Federation of Labor, but will be distinct.

Pierre Has Natural Gas.

PIERRE, S. D., Nov. 19.—After many experiments the Locke hotel management has at last secured a burner by which they get a pure white light from the natural gas from the artesian well and the whole house is now lighted from that source, besides the gas used for fuel.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT.

Revenues Show an Increase and Expenditures a Decrease.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—D. N. Morgan, treasurer of the United States, in his annual report on the condition of the treasury says the net ordinary revenues of the government for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1895, were \$313,890,075, an increase of \$15,968,055, as compared with the year before; net ordinary expenditures, \$356,195,298, a decrease of \$11,838,981. Including the public debt, the total receipts on all accounts were \$720,531,688, and the expenditures \$710,473,157. A further sum of \$81,167,700 was deposited in the treasury prior to the end of June on account of a purchase of gold coin to maintain the reserve, but was not formally covered in, and therefore does not appear in the accounts for the current fiscal year.

THEIR SKULLS SPLIT OPEN.

Two Negro Women Murdered and Mutilated Near Russellville, Ark.
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 23.—One mile west of Russellville two negro women, who were camping in the woods, had their heads split open with an axe and were otherwise horribly mutilated. John Coleman, the husband of one of the women, is suspected of the crime, as he had frequent trouble with his wife. Coleman was arrested and lodged in jail.

John Colliton Turns Up Alive.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 23.—John Colliton, who was reported to the police Thursday by telegrams from Aberdeen, S. D., as having been found dead at that place, is at his father's home in this city, in his usual state of health. The father, Patrick Colliton of 207 University avenue northeast, reported that fact to the police. The denial of the report of his death is a great relief to the young man's friends in this city, but leaves the authorities at Aberdeen with a large sized murder mystery on their hands.

THE AMEER IN A PASSION.

Vents His Rage by Burning His Subjects Alive.
LONDON, Nov. 21.—The Evening News publishes a letter from Huetta, a small town of Beloochistan, near the Afghanistan frontier, which states that the ameer of Afghanistan is greatly annoyed at the failure of Nazrullah Khan, his second son, to arrange for a permanent Afghanistan representative at London during his recent visit to England. In consequence of the rage of the ameer many persons have been burned alive, a number of his subjects have been imprisoned, while many others have fled from the country. A notable who accompanied Prince Nazrullah on the occasion of his visit to England, named Kotwal, is to be tortured as soon as he arrives at Cabul. It is expected that Nazrullah Khan himself will be punished, and that possibly he will be banished from Afghanistan.

MUCH WRECKAGE COMES ASHORE

Beach at Charlevoix, Mich., Strawn with Portions of Boat.
DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 21.—A special to The News from Charlevoix, Mich., says the shore four miles north of here is strewn with wreckage. Among it is a quantity of ceiling and other cabin fittings, part of a door and quantities of 8-inch planking, evidently torn from the decks of a boat. The wreckage has a mixed appearance, as though some of it is from a schooner and some from a steamer. The only thing found toward identifying the wreckage is an old life preserver bearing the stenciled name "Lycoming." The Lycoming, however, is safe, having just left Milwaukee for Chicago.

BRINGS SUIT FOR \$200,000.

Buxton Mining Company Seeks to Recover for Alleged Stolen Ore.
DEADWOOD, S. D., Nov. 21.—Suit has been instituted in the United States circuit court by the Buxton Mining company of this city against the Golden Reward Mining company. In the complaint the plaintiff states that in 1893 the Bonanza claim was patented and alleges that during the years 1891 and 1892 the Golden Reward company extended its tunnels into the Bonanza claim some 500 feet, extracting ore therefrom estimated to be worth \$200,000, for which amount suit is brought to recover. It was not known by the Bonanza people until about two months ago that the Golden Reward company was trespassing upon and extracting ore from their mine.

ONE WAY TO HARMONIZE.

Tammany Representatives Say It Is Early Done—Let the Others Withdraw.
NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—The attempt of the Democratic state committee to harmonize the regular and reform factions of the party on legislative candidates will probably be abortive. Perry Belmont and his colleagues on the harmony committee spent eight hours in conference with the opposing forces, but without result. Neither side showed any inclination to make concessions. It was finally decided that propositions would be drawn up and submitted to the harmony committee.

Tammany will offer to divide the legislative patronage with the State Democracy, on a numerical basis, but will decline to concede the demand of the Grace people for one-third of the candidates for senators and assemblymen.

They'll Never Withdraw.

James J. Martin, chairman of the executive committee of Tammany, indicated the programme of that organization in an interview.

"The Tammany men who have been nominated," he said, "cannot be induced to withdraw, nor would the conventions which nominated them ever sanction their withdrawal. The bosses of the State Democracy may be able to set up and knock down candidates at will, but you can't do any such a thing in Tammany Hall. When a man wins a nomination in Tammany Hall he is entitled to it, and nothing can take it away from him. We think we can win in the disputed districts. The Grace people are already discredited with the voters. No Democrat is going to vote for a State Democracy or assembly or senatorial candidate when he knows that the vote is going to help elect a Republican United States senator."

Hill Anxious for Harmony.

"Senator Hill is anxious to bring about harmony, but he evidently does not quite understand the situation in New York. Tammany cannot give way to an organization that has been stabling the Democratic party in the back for years. If the State Democracy is really anxious to secure a Democratic majority in the next assembly and senate, let them withdraw all their candidates and turn in and support the regular Democratic nominees. We will guarantee to them whatever consideration in the way of patronage the numerical strength of their organization entitles them to."

Germany Also Protests.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—The correspondent of The Daily News at Constantinople says that nobody believes the official dispatches declaring that disorders have ceased. The foreign consuls at Erzerum, after a careful inquiry, signed a joint report confirming the account of the massacres already received. According to The Daily News correspondent at Constantinople, the German government has joined with Lord Salisbury and has entered a plea in behalf of the Armenians attacked at Zeitoun.

Youthful Hunter Killed.

MORA, Minn., Nov. 25.—An accidental shooting occurred about two miles south of this place. The 10-year-old son of William Graeber was shot in the shoulder and died in about 15 minutes from the loss of blood. The boy was out hunting with a hired man by the name of August Schultz. Schultz was getting over a log and slipped, discharging the gun.

Killed His Children and Himself.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Hyman Hettenhost, a well known pugilist and trainer of Brooklyn, shot and killed his two children and himself. Hettenhost was the proprietor of a college of physical instruction in Brooklyn.

Stringent Measures Against Diphtheria.

SALEM, S. D., Nov. 25.—In order to more effectually stamp out the diphtheria here, parents and guardians of children under 15 years of age are forbidden to permit them to leave their premises under penalty of fine.

Russian Fleet Held in Readiness.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—A dispatch to The Times from Sebastopol says that the Black sea fleet, which 10 days ago was ordered to lay up for the winter, has been recommissioned, and that the troops stationed at Odessa have been warned to be in readiness for active service.

Allow Guardships to Pass.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 23.—Advices from Constantinople say that the sultan has consented to allow the passage in through the Dardanelles of a second guardship for each power in accordance with the requests of the Austrian, Italian, Russian and British representatives.


