Here is some good advice for people who beleive in practicing purchasing articles from traveling venders, or who send away for goods that can be procured at home: " If a traveling peddler comes along and tries to sell goods, before purchasing, ask him if he will take your butter, egges, hides and other produce. Ask him if, when your neighbor gets ready to build a road or bridge across the creek or slough, if he is willing to donate a few dollars to help it along. Tell him there is a poor widow down the road who would be very thankful if he would donate a few provisions. Finally, say to him that money will be scarce next season and would he mind trusting you for a few dollars' worth of goods. If he agrees to all this, then patronize him.
