Now we read this in last week's daily paper as an advertisement and the Folley Bros. are well known as capitalists and hustling and reliable men.—Jackson Republic.

As soon as Gov. Clough was officially notified of the condition of the Minnesota boys, he at once arranged for sending a special train to the south to transport the sick ones home. He is quoted as having instructed the colonels of the regiments to inform him of any wants that might exist in the camps, but his instructions were not considered of any consequence or they would have been recognized, therefore some of our Minnesota army officers are deserving of censure as the governor would undoubtedly relieved the distress that existed among the Minnesota troops, all that was possible within his authority had he been properly notified.

In 1892 Mr. Osborne told us that Free Trade in Wool would mean better prices. Coffee seconded the motion and voted for then Wilson bill. The result was 5-cent wool. In 1894 Johnny Osborne told us that it was not Free Trade which caused the decline in wool. It was something else, which did not seem exactly clear to him, probably the failure of the Baring Bros. The people thought differently and voted for William McKinley and a Protection Congress. In spite of the opposition of Osborne the Dingley bill was passed and wool raised to fourteen cents. The silver forces are at loss to know what issue to make the state campaigns on this fall. Some of them want to still fight it out on the money question while others desire to make the condition of our soldiers the issue. Of course those that desire to use the latter as argument that they should be placed in office admit the weakness of the former, while the former probably realize that criticizing the war management would be a poor idea to tie a campaign to, therefore they are at sea, and diversion of opinion will place democrats and populists beyond any chance of again attaining any strength of any importance in the political world.

The Iowa republicans have adopted a platform that has resonated in it that ring out from ocean to ocean. It starts out like this, "That the experience of the last two years has fully approved the gold standard policy of the republican party as declared by the national convention of 1896.... All other money must be kept at parity with gold. Our money, like our institutions, should be maintained equal to the best in the world." This is considerable different from tactics the fusion forces are now going through with, not knowing what principle to fight their battle on. The above plank is worthy of the highest commendation throughout the land and the present situation is a pillar of support that cannot be broken down by the most scholarly statesman in the silver forces ranks.

Democratic County Conventions. The Democrats of Nobles county will hold a convention at Rushmore Minn., on Monday, Sept. 26, 1898, at 1 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of electing ten (10) delegates to represent the county at the legislative convention to be held at Duluth on Sept. 27, also; to place nomination candidates for the following county offices, to be voted for at the general election to be held Nov. 3, 1898: Auditor, Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Clerk of Court, Sheriff, Judge of Probate, County Attorney, Superintendent of Schools, Surveyor, Coroner and Court Commissioners, and candidates for county commissioners in the second and fourth districts; to elect a county committee and transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The basis of representation shall be one delegate at large for each district and one additional delegate for each twenty five votes, or major

fraction thereof, cast for W. J. Bryan for president in 1896.
