Refused Admission.

John Walker, aged about fourteen years old, son of James Walker, has been refused admission to our public schools because of not being vaccinated.

Mr. Walker having the Dowie faith does not believe in vaccination and will not have him vaccinated.

He first applied for admission early in January and was given a permit to attend one month, at the end of this time, not being vaccinated he was denied admission.

The case was laid before Attorney Wilson who, to get the matter before the court will have a mandamus served Friday on the school board and Superintendent to show cause why the boy had been denied admission. The writ is returnable Monday afternoon at two o'clock before Judge Brown.

Tuesday the jury answered to roll call. A. J. Williams removed from the county. John T. Milton, of Ransom, was excused from serving on account of sickness at home. The case of Van Santvoord & Geer receivers of Wood Harvesting Machine Co. vs. Mark Graves, Wilson Borst and J. A. Town, attorneys, was the first case taken up.
