When the Chinese begin to lose heart in facing the allies, the critical stage of the situation for those who are imprisoned in Pekin will have been reached. The allies will have pressed forward vigorously and simultaneously, and by forced marches reach Pekin in time to co-operate with the brave people who have been holding off the bloodthirsty Boxers and their sympathizers for many weeks. A frenzied army turned back in utter rout to the Chinese capital might swarm upon the beleaguered foreign legations and massacre them while the guns of the allies are pounding at the walls of the city. The Chinese government will be wise if under the pretext of holding the ministers as hostages it should smuggle them to places of safety.—Milwaukee Evening Wisconsin.

After a reign of terror lasting for many weeks, the Democrats of North Carolina have carried an election in favor of a constitutional amendment intended to bar colored citizens from the exercise of the elective franchise and establish white supremacy in that state. The amendment proceeds by indirection, being nominally devised only to control registration; but as none who are not registered will be permitted to vote, it will have the effect of restricting the suffrage. It declares that every person seeking enrollment "shall be able to read and write any section of the constitution in the English language," and shall have paid before the first day of March preceding his poll tax to be made a lien only on assessed property, and the constitution prohibits the issuance of process to enforce it against individuals having no assessed property. In other words, it is not a lawful obligation, but is made, in the case of needy and impetuous persons, a condition of registration. To this extent, the proposed amendment—establishing an education test and a property qualification for registration—however objectionable, is not open to the charge of discrimination, but the amendment further provides that all male persons entitled to vote anywhere in the United States on January 1, 1867, or the lineal descendants of any such persons, are exempted from the education qualification, but not from the poll tax. Thus a citizen of North Carolina who desires to be registered must be able to read and write any section of the constitution in the English language, unless his father or grandfather could vote before the establishment of equal suffrage for white and colored citizens.

There is no longer any doubt that the allied military and naval force at Tien Tsin has begun to Pekin. Nothing definite has been received as to the progress made by the advance guard, but news of fighting may soon be expected, as the latest information in regard to the Chinese lines was to the effect that they cover an arc of about thirty miles at a distance of from ten to fifteen miles from Tien Tsin. From what is known of the fighting character of the Chinese troops, the allies will probably have a sharp and severe contest with the defenders when they first strike their lines, but after the first onset and victory by the allies
