NEW BLOCK.

Mr Dayton Will Put Up Another One on Nicollet Avenue.

George D. Dayton, who as the builder of the Dayton and other prominent business blocks on Nicollet avenue, has repeatedly shown his faith in the future of Minneapolis and in that business street, and that side of the street in particular, will erect a three-story brick business block at 816-18 Nicollet avenue, and workmen are already engaged in tearing down the small frame buildings now occupying the site of this new testimonial to the tendency of business enterprises to leave the river and move out into the residence districts.

J. C. Hall, of 738 Lumber Exchange, will supervise the construction for Mr. Dayton, and plans are already about completed by Charles S. Sedgwick, architect.

As far as completed the specifications show up a handsome three-story press brick and terra cotta front. The building will be 52 by 100 feet, and will be furnished with steam heat, electric and gas light and plate glass front, on the first and second floors.

De Lancey and Robinson have already been awarded the contract for the foundation, which will be put in at once, and the entire building completed by May 1.

While it is not generally known that the erection of such a building has been contemplated, one-half of it has already been leased, and prospective tenants are in sight for the other half.—Minneapolis Tribune.

INSANE.

A Wilmont Farmer Loses His Mind Over Hypnotism.

Sunday afternoon Sheriff Reiter was summoned to Wilmont township to take care of an insane man.

Monday morning Hans Karsten, a German, was brought before Judge Cory and examining physicians, Clark and Dolan, and was adjudged insane.

Mr. Karsten is a farmer fifty years old, owning the southwest quarter of section eleven, Wilmont. During the past few weeks he has been studying hypnotism, having secured books on the question through newspaper advertisements. Friday night he attempted to hypnotize some of his family but it failing to work he became vexed and later reached a state that frightened the family and they attempted to leave the house but he would not permit it but they eluded him and informed the neighbors. Saturday the neighbors tied him up but one party thought he could manage him and unfastened Mr. Karsten. He was no sooner loose than he grabbed a shelf tearing it from the wall. While he was alone in the house he broke a couple of lamps, one of them being lighted, a lounge and other articles of furniture.

Sheriff Reiter was accompanied on the return trip by Jno. Webber, Wm. Kleif and Jno. Spartz. On the way here the buggy was considerably broken by the insane man in his struggles to secure freedom. On arrival here he was securely bound in the cell and kept so. When brought into court he struggled to free himself and talked his native language.

He has been a hardworking farmer, drank some time to excess, not quarrelsome. He has twelve children, oldest a girl seventeen years old and youngest three years old. He has lost flesh rapidly since becoming insane and is said not to look at all as he did when sane.

Sheriff Reiter and John Webber left on the afternoon train with Karsten for St. Peter.
