OBITUARY.

Perry Johnson, born Nov. 4, 1870, died, April 2, 1904, of typhoid fever. He came to Worthington with his parents John H. Johnson in 1872. A brother and sister died in infancy and a brother named Guy died in 1893. His father died in 1890 and his mother 1903. His nearest surviving living relative being an aunt Jennine Belding, living at Corning, Iowa.

Perry was only sick about three weeks, when first attacked he was taken to the hospital and a special nurse provided so there was no lack of attention or skill. The funeral was held Monday afternoon at his old home. Rev. C. K. Bidwell of the Baptist Church, officiating. The order of Eagles were present in a body and escorted the remains to the cemetery, performing their last sad rites over a departed brother. He was a member of the order at Billings, Mont. There were numerous floral offerings. Perry was familiarly known to every citizen. He was a peculiar character in some respects, but always cheerful and jovial, and made friends wherever he went. Good hearted and generous.

Charter Commission.

Judge Brown Appoints a committee to Frame a New One.

Judge Brown signed an order Tuesday in the matter of appointment of Freeholders to frame a charter for the government of the Village of Worthington.

A short time ago petitions were circulated requesting this action. The petitions were signed by every one asked with but very few exceptions. No attempt was made to secure everyone, but just enough to comply with the law which requires ten percent of the legal voters next to and preceding the date of making the order creating the commission. The charter is to be framed under the provisions of Chapter 351 of 1899 and acts amendatory thereto. The board of Freeholders is as follows: Daniel Shell, J. N. Gould, H. Hawley, M. P. Mann, F. L. Humiston, Gus Swanberg, G. W. Wilson, James Ramage, C. M. Crandall, J. A. Town, F. Glasgow, W. E. Madison, W. M. Evans, E. C. Pannell, James Mackay.
