Pastor Erikson has been appointed delegate from this state to attend the synodical meeting of the Lutheran church to be held at Lynsburg, Kansas, next month.


There were two trains of the excursionists to the twin Cities Saturday.one of nine cars and one of ten. About twenty of our people joined the crowd.
