Misses Smith, of Kinbrae, have been guests at the home of Vandy Dubs, the past week.

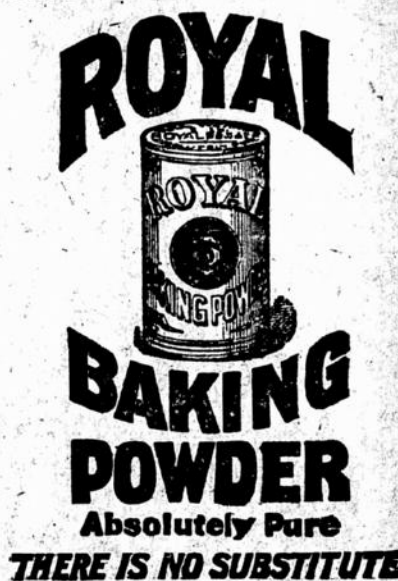
