THE PRIMARY ELECTION

Thoughts on The New Law By a Rural Resident.

On Tuesday next, the 30th, is the primary election, and every good citizen who can attend ought to make it a point to do so. The primary election law was passed to give the general public the power to say who shall serve them as public officials. The time has been when a mere handful of men "made up the slate," and all that was left for the voter to do was to go to the polls and vote the ticket made up by the bosses. Under the new law, it is the privilege of every voter to have a voice not only in voting his party ticket but also in making it.

Then, again, the time has been when a man, be he ever so capable and deserving, had hardly a ghost of a chance to receive the nomination for any desirable office unless he was "in with the ring." Now any man who is entitled to vote has the privilege to announce himself as a candidate for office, and if he be capable and popular, his chances are as good as any other man's.

Of the two elections the primary and the general election, if one is more important than the other, I am inclined to think the primary is the most important of the two, for it is there we can express our preference for the men we wish placed on the ticket. If we have a friend who has announced himself as a candidate and we wish to see him elected, the time to serve him is at the primary, for if our friend fails to get the nomination we can not afterwards do anything to help him.

The complaint has been made that voters in the country, the farmers, do not turn out to vote at the primary. We are sorry it should be so, but yet there is some excuse for this. The man living in the village has to walk but a few blocks at furthest to reach the polls, and has a clean sidewalk to walk on; while some farmers have to drive three or four miles to the polls, and some times over muddy roads. There are a good many farmers, however, who live near enough to the polls to vote without much inconvenience, and they ought to vote without fail. It would be cause for regret if when the general public has been given the privilege of naming their candidates for office we should seem to show by our indifference that we do not appreciate the privilege. Let all who can turn out to the primary, and show their interest in good government by voting for good men to administer it.

Eternal vigilance, it has been said, is the price of liberty, and certain it is that if we would enjoy good, honest government, be it county, state or national, eternal vigilance is the price we must pay for it.

Contrary to the general expectation chicken shooting this fall is unusually poor. In this locality few chickens have been killed for the first two weeks of the season, and the city sharks who come out every year are not getting their usual amount of sport at chicken shooting, and as the season is somewhat early for ducks the city hunters must return home disappointed. However, the duck season promises to be good and it is expected that they will be plentiful as soon as the weather becomes a trifle colder.
