

ADRIAN SALOON IS ROBBED

Barney McCarty is Held to Grand Jury for the Crime.

Adrian had another saloon robbery sensation last week, and as a result Barney McCarty is now occupying a cell in the county jail. The burglary was committed Friday night, but before he made good his escape he was arrested by local authorities, and Saturday morning he had a preliminary hearing before Justice of Peace O. W. Freeman.

At the hearing McCarty was found guilty and bound over to await the action of the grand jury which meets next February. He has been unable to give bail and consequently he will have to languish in durance vile until his trial comes up at the next regular term of the district court.

He secured about \$7.00 in the saloon besides helping himself to some fire water that was at hand. The prisoner has also admitted to having stolen a watch belonging to Mrs. Thompson about whose restaurant he had been staying some. When the watch was found missing Mrs. Thompson pointed to McCarty but she was giving him no watch was found.

At first it was thought that he had hid the watch, which theory proved correct afterwards. It was a few days after he had been searched for the watch that he robbed the saloon, and since he has admitted the theft of the timepiece.

He was brought over from Adrian on Sunday by Constables William Marr and Frank McLean. Mr. McLean's son Frank also came over with the party.

E. J. HELMICK SELLS OUT

Central Restaurant is Bought by W. S. Shanon of Chokio.

Last Saturday a deal was negotiated for the sale of the Central restaurant to W. S. Shanon of Chokio Minn. For the present the restaurant will be under the management of E. J. The Central restaurant has been a paying property, but on account of poor health Mr. Helmick was compelled to get out of the business. Since last spring he has on several occasions been advised to do so by his physician.

The sale of the property may not necessarily cause Mr. Helmick to relinquish his residence in Worthington, as he has several business propositions under consideration and either one of them would retain his residence here.
