DISTRICT COURT.

Grinds Out Justice for Nobles County Litigants.

The October term of the District court for Nobles county convened on Monday morning at 10 o'clock, with Judge Quinn of the 17th district presiding in place of Judge Brown, who is confined to his home by ill health. Sheriff Fauske and Clerk of Court Humiston were in their respective places.

The calendar contained 57 cases, five of which were criminal cases and 52 pertained to civil matters.

The Grand Jury was in session two days and returned two indictments, as follows: Geo. Vicker-man, for assault in the second degree. The assault was committed at Ellsworth last spring, the victim being his own father. Attorney E. C. Wilson was appointed by the court to defend him. He plead not guilty and the case has been set for trial the 24th.

Charlie Lewis was indicted for abduction. This is the outcome of the so-called elopement. Lewis plead not guilty and the case was set for next week. Town and Jones will defend him.

High School Foot Ball Team Defeats Sheldon--Score 11 to 0.

The Worthington team reached Sheldon about 2:30 last Saturday. It looked rather discouraging for a game as the rain seemed to be increasing. The game was called at the Fair Ground and the building furnished protection from the rain. About 3:30 the rain practically ceased and the game was called. Worthington got their choice and received the kick-off. Sheldon made a good kick-off and downed the ball on Worthington's fifteen yard line. The Worthington team then carried the ball down the field by two to five yard gains until a touch down came after about 15 minutes of play. About the third play, Pettit was compelled to retire. The boys felt discouraged and thought their team was surely having hard luck. John Ramage took Pettit's place and played a fine game all through. Worthington kicked goal giving them six points.

Worthington then kicked-off to Sheldon and Sheldon made same good gains carrying other ball to the middle of the field. They then lost the ball on downs and Worthington carried the ball back to near the goal line but time was called and saved Sheldon from another score.

The second half Worthington kicked-off to Sheldon. The Worthington line men began at once to break through the Sheldon line and soon held for downs and secured the ball. Good progress was made on regular line plays, but Worthington fumbled and lost. Sheldon was held for downs, again and lost the ball, and Worthington soon made the second touchdown, the ball going over on a quarter run by Sterling Lawton. Time proved too short for another score by either team and the final score stood 11 to 10 in favor of Worthington. Both teams played a clean plucky game.
