**INSPECTION AND BALL**

Co. F Subjected to Rigid Inspection by Col. Gerlach, of the U. S. A.

Splendid Showing Made by the Militia Boys Elicits High Praise.

Special Hop at the Maccabee Hall a Very Enjoyable Event.

Wednesday was the first red-letter day in the history of Co. F of this city, and was an occasion the militia boys will look back to with pride. The occasion was the annual inspection, which was conducted by Col. Wm. Gerlach, of the Regular Army, who has been detailed for this duty in the state of Minnesota.

The company mustered for roll call at 3:30, after which they marched to the fair grounds, where the drill and review was held. After inspection of arms and drill in firing the company was put through a series of evolutions, including close and extended order and skirmish drill, and guard duty.

The work of the company was a revelation to all who witnessed the drill, and reflects great credit both on the officers and men.

At 8:30 in the evening the company was put through the manual of arms at Maccabee hall. This was followed by a ball, which was well attended and proved a very enjoyable event.

In speaking of the work of Co. F to an Advance reporter, Col. Gerlach said the performance was remarkable, considering the short time the company has been organized, and that if they continued to improve in the future as they have in the past, they would soon be one of the crack companies of the state. He also congratulated the company on having as its commanding officer Capt. Schaefer, one of the best militia officers in the state. He also complimented the work of the other officers, both commissioned and non-commissioned.

The inspection developed the fact that Worthington has a militia company of which it can well be proud, and it is to be hoped our citizens will be prompted to provide a more suitable armory, which will enable the boys to acquire the proficiency requisite to place them at the head of the militia companies of the state.

**RELIEF FOR CALIFORNIANS.**

Worthington People Respond Promptly and Liberally to the Appeal for Aid of Earthquake Victims.

Mayor Madison called a mass meeting of the citizens of Worthington last Friday evening to consider plans for raising money for the relief of victims of the earthquake and fire in San Francisco and other California cities. After some discussion a committee composed of Mayor Madison and Messrs. A. T. Latta, Jas. Mackay and C. T. Tupper was appointed to solicit subscriptions. The committee went to work early Saturday morning and made a fairly thorough canvass of the city, and raised nearly \$350, which at once telegraphed to the San Francisco Relief Committee. The promptness of our citizens in taking up the relief work and their generosity in contributing is very commendable. According to the latest daily press reports the amount raised throughout the country for the relief of the earthquake victims exceeds \$20,000,000.
