The consequence of this omission is apparent and fraught with great danger to the state and the taxpayer.

The Globe last week threw a fit because the Republican nominee for the state senate is a banker, and lays great unction to its soul because the Democratic nominee is only a lawyer. Both are honorable callings and both candidates are honorable men, so to sane men the accident of calling can make no difference, and if it did Mr. Flynn is in the same boat with Mr. Bedford, for he has been vice president of the bank at Ellsworth for several years. The changed attitude of the Globe lends color to the rumor that the change in its management was procured by a Republican ex-boss to slaughter the Republican nominee and otherwise get revenge, but that paper will find it is only cutting off its own nose to spite an ill-omened face. The Globe has the reputation of having always been a hoodoo, and always will be as long as the reason for its existence is spite and vengeance.

Brewster Tribune: Captain A. S. Schaefer, of the Worthington militia company, who is a candidate for railroad and warehouse commissioner on the democratic ticket, is a traveling salesman for a wholesale house, but makes his home at Rushmore, and knows S. B. Bedford intimately for many years. In a late interview Capt. Schaefer made the following statement, in substance, to the editor of the Tribune: "Of all the men I have ever known, the one who comes the nearest to my idea of what a true, unselfish, Christian gentleman should be is S. B. Bedford. He is

a regular attendant" and a liberal supporter of the church, and takes his religion with him in to every business and social transaction during the other six days of the week." Don't you think that such a man is a pretty safe one to send to the state senate?

Among the twenty five reasons given by the democratic press bureau why Governor Johnson should be re-elected, the first is:

"Governor Johnson has saved the state \$30,000 in less than two years by having the Insurance Commissioner placed on a salary basis."

Governor Johnson himself said the fact of the matter, however, is that the saving was the result of law introduced in the state legislature by Doctor A. B. Cole, Chairman of the Republican State Central Committee and its passage secured by him despite Democratic opposition.

The second claim in this precious document is that:

"His administration of the Dairy and Food department has driven from the state the box car dealer in foreign impure foods."

Nonsense: The box car dealer was driven from the state by the law passed by a republican legislature of which a republican representative Marcus Lauritsen, was the author.

The third claim is that Governor Johnson has shared the common lot in the fight against adversity, which is pure flapdoodle. Everybody shares the common lot, but this is no reason why everybody should be elected governor.

The fourth claim is that he has added 2,000,000 pounds to the capacity of the binder twine plant. Bladderdash! The board of managers is responsible for that and it would have been done whoever was governor or if we had had an interregnum.

The fifth claim is that he has reduced child labor in Minnesota. His own labor commissioner, however, says that there is now more child labor in the state than at any time in its history. Anyway, he did nothing whatever about child labor.

He claims, sixth, that he has made public timber in the northern woods as safe as though it were in the capitol. Nonsense! If timber is safe, it is because of S. T. Johnson's revelations, and because of the resultant persecutions of a republican Attorney General.

It is claimed, seventh, that by his energetic action freight rates have been reduced \$1,500,000 this year alone. Absurd again! The only thing Johnson did to secure reductions was after twenty months of conference with the railroad and warehouse commission and write one letter. The result was brought about by a republican commission acting on a joint resolution of a republican legislature, introduced by a republican senator, who is now a candidate for lieutenant governor. And Johnson's other eighteen claims where they mean anything at all, are as baseless and absurd as the seven examined above.

J. F. Jacobson is making a strong campaign for A. L. Cole. His speeches are being well received everywhere. As to the nomination of Mr. Cole and the manner of its tender Mr. Jacobson said in his speech at Owatonna: "Mr. Cole got that nomination just as fairly and squarely as any nomination ever given in the state. Is there any Republican who will say that that nomination was not fairly gotten? Now let me ask you that if you are going to begin to question about any candidate on the state ticket why begin at the top of the ticket and stop there? Mr. Cole is as good a man and as much entitled to your support as any other man on the ticket. There is no more reason for you to go back on him than any of the rest. If you are leaning toward Democratic principles and want to support Bryan or Hearst, vote for Johnson and the rest of the Democratic ticket, but come out like a man and say that you are a democrat."

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
What Mr. Hearst ought to do is to syndicate about fifteen or twenty offices and run for them all in a bunch. It would save time and expense.
