

TILE FACTORY IS ASSURED

C. E. Sims, of Lincoln, Ill., Has Formed Company, With Local Support

Capital to be \$15,000, Nearly All of Which has Been Subscribed

Work on \$10,000 Plant to Begin as Soon as Incorporation is Perfected

Mr. Chas. E. Sims, of Lincoln, Ill., who for some weeks has been figuring on establishing a concrete tile and block factory in Worthington, arrived in the city the latter part of last week and set to work to interest local capitalists in the project with such good results that the enterprise is now assured.

Just as soon as incorporated the company proposes to erect a plant costing \$10,000, which will be the largest of its kind in the state.

It is proposed to manufacture all sizes of concrete drain tile, building blocks, sidewalk blocks, reinforced fence posts, and to contract for all kinds of concrete construction.


To the Voters of Murray and Nobles Counties.
