Many Matters of Interest to All Virginians. QUARTERMASTER CAPTAINS. Richmond's Quiet Social Season. To Get Up Spring Races. Baseball Park Improvements. Travellers' Protective Association.

Special Dispatch to the Virginian.

RICHMOND, Va., January 31.—As has been stated in the newspapers, Lieut. Knight, the United States Army officer stationed here, is a candidate for one of the quartermaster captaincies soon to be filled. Three appointments are to be made before the 4th of March. The Lieutenant is a Virginian, but for seven years was on the frontier before being assigned to duty in his native State. He has a strong backing. The solid Texas delegation in Congress is said to be for him, as well as many other Senators and Representatives. The Secretary of the Navy has the appointments to make. A good many influential Virginians have written letters to Washington in the interest of the Lieutenant. This young gentleman is a near relative of Mrs. Charles T. O'Ferrall, who was a Miss Knight. He is a splendid looking young man and exceedingly popular here.

The social season has not been what might be called a brilliant one in Richmond. There have been about the usual number of parties and private get-togethers, but no really swell affairs. It is hard to account for this. For several years past, until this year, the social event was the entertainment given always in January under the auspices of the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities. First there was the Colonial Assembly with the minute dance as the feature; then the Sir Roger De Coverly a year later, followed by the cotton bloom ball. This year for some cause the association has not given any entertainment. They have been fewer brilliant weddings than Richmond usually has in a season.

The movement under the auspices of the Riding and Driving Club of Richmond looking to spring races in Richmond is meeting with much favor with horsemen, and it looks as if the scheme would succeed. Efforts have been made each year for several past to get up spring races here, but the efforts always failed. The club organized now has about 150 members and is growing rapidly. Those at the head of the movement here received encouragement from many turfmen outside of Virginia. Less than a week ago Col. Cab. Maddux, who is interested in the race courses in Alexandria, told me a spring meeting in Richmond would bring many noted horsemen here. Alderman George McD. Blake is at the head of the club, and all the local lovers of the sport are working with him.

Col. Jon S. Harwood, chairman of the National Legislative Committee of the Travellers' Protective Association, received a telegram from Washington, announcing the passage of the "Drummers' bill" by the Senate. It now goes to the President. This measure so amends the inter State commerce act as to authorize the selling of interchangeable mileage tickets. While the measure is intended primarily to benefit the commercial travellers, its operations will not be confined to them. It is claimed that the bill will save merchants and manufacturers millions of dollars annually. Col. Harwood spent some time in Washington engineering the bill through the Senate.

Extensive improvements are being made to the baseball park here. The grounds will be larger than last year. Left field fence has been moved back and it will not be so easy to make home run hits. Sporting men think there will be more interest in the national game in Richmond this year than last. Richmond is going to have a crack club and a first base manager, and somehow the ranks have got the idea that the pennant will certainly come to Richmond. They will therefore be right in the sport from the start. Some enterprising citizens have leased the Academy of Music when the games played away from home will be reported by telegraph.

S. J. Reizenstein, the traveling salesman for whose arrest a warrant was sworn out a few days ago, was a prisoner in Justice Crutchfield's court this morning. He was charged with trespassing on a car of the Richmond and Manchester Railway Company. Reizenstein boarded a car at Seventh and Cary streets and offered the conductor a Main street transfer, which was refused. The conductor demanded a fare. The drummer refused to pay it and, after some difficulty, he was permitted under protest of the conductor, to ride, and subsequently the warrant was issued. The case was continued for a hearing on the 7th of next month. He has employed Mr. Charles W. Dunstan to defend the case.

Maj. James D. Patton, of the city, was very much concerned when he learned of the Elbe disaster. Maj. Of her cargo of cotton, 700 bales were damaged by fire, 1,100 were badly damaged by water and 1,250 were slightly damaged by steam, while 2,381 were sound.
