What is Going on in and Around the Capital City.

The United States Senatorship Discussed. Talk About the Southern Railway and the People of West Point. The Gold Brick Man's Bail Bond.

RICHMOND, Va., June 21.—To-morrow will mark the beginning of a new era in the history of Richmond College. Prof. F. W. Boatwright, the new President, whose election some months ago aroused much indignation among a portion of the students and some of the faculty, will be formally installed in office. There will be some public exercises. Mr. Boatwright is a very young man, being less than thirty, but is said to be possessed of marked ability as an executive and as an instructor. All the members of the faculty who were not in sympathy with his election have retired. Friends of the College naturally feel some anxiety as to what will be the effect of the departure of the three oldest professors. There will be no contest over the bail bond of the gold brick man's, Mr. Mann S. Quarles, vice president of the Virginia Trust Company, which is surety for Parker, said to-day the money would be paid just soon as he is officially notified that the bond is forfeited. There has been a rumor current here that friends of Parker, who put up the money, would make a legal fight to recover the same.

It is said that all the Senatorial districts where elections are to be made this fall Daniel's friends will be quite active, and will try to secure the nomination of persons who will support the Major for the United States Senate. The State Senators to be chosen will vote for Daniel's successor. If Gov. O'Ferrall proposes to be a candidate he will also probably get in a little work. State Senator George A. Mushback, of the Alexandria District, has announced himself a candidate for re-election and states that he is for Daniel. Some twenty or twenty one Senators are to be elected.

The news that the Southern Railway Company will make Norfolk the deep water terminus is distressing to the people of the town of West Point. That town depends upon the Southern road for its existence. For many years it has been feared by the citizens that the business would be transferred to either Norfolk or Newport News. Most of the railroad people at West Point own property there and it will become almost worthless when the change is made. It is, of course, not known as yet to just what extent the change will effect the King William town.

BACK FROM THE DEAD.

Husband and Wife Reunited After Being Apart For Thirty Years.

A happy reunion of a husband and wife after an estrangement of 30 years has just been effected in Somerset county, Pa.

Emmanuel Beck and Sarah Beck, nee Irwin, were married half a century ago. They settled on a farm in Wisconsin. When the war broke out, Emmanuel Beck enlisted in the Thirty-third Wisconsin regiment and served until the close of the conflict, when he returned to his family. He moved to Dakota, but hardly had the family settled when Beck was caught by the gold fever and started for the Black Hills.

In a short time word came to his family that Beck had been found in his cabin murdered by outlaws, who had carried away his gold, and Mrs. Beck and children returned to their former home near Johnston.

A few months ago she heard that her husband was living at Montrose, Colo., and the husband and wife are together once more.—New York Journal.

A Clever Gang of Sharpers.

A gang of sharpers, with headquarters in Cincinnati, is practicing one of the cleverest swindling schemes that have been devised for many a day through the states of Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Illinois and West Virginia. The scheme has as its foundation marked cards.

A member of the gang first enters a town and sells a stock of marked cards at a price that is next to nothing under the pretext of "introducing the goods." The rest of the gang follows, and for days the unsuspecting innocents are bled and cheated. The strangers send out and buy the cards they can read so well, and there is no suspicion. It is said that at Indianapolis the gang cleared over \$15,000 in a few weeks.—New York Herald.

THE COCKADE CITY.

Many Matters to Interest Petersburgers in Norfolk.

Special Dispatch to the Virginian.

PETERSBURG, Va., June 21.—Deputy Sheriff S. H. Bacon, of Lunenburg county, who brought to Petersburg yesterday afternoon, Solomon Marable, Mary Abernathy and Poky Barnes, three of the negroes charged with the murder of Mrs. Lucy J. Pollard in that county, told me to-day that he was untroubled until he reached Petersburg that an attempt would be made by a mob to take the prisoners from him and his guards to lynch them.

Deputy Bacon stated that when he brought the prisoners out of the county jail and placed them in the wagon, a crowd of seventy-five men was standing around the jail. Deputy Bacon stated that he had not been in bed since last Friday and that he had had but very little sleep. He also said the same thing in reference to Mr. J. W. Ellis, the Sheriff of Lunenburg county, who had been kept busy looking after the safety of the prisoners. Deputy Bacon told me that while on his way to Petersburg with the prisoners Poky Barnes complained of the rope with which she was tied hurting her and that while he was in the act of making the rope feel more comfortable to the woman Mary Abernathy, who is a very large and portly female, weighing something over 200 pounds, remarked to him, "that if he would give her the rope she would hang Solomon Marable to a tree, Marable's parents are Gramson and Easter Marable and reside at Dexter Postoffice, Vance county, N. C. His wife's name is Fannie Marable, and she resides near Bullock's Postoffice, Granville county, N. C. Deputy Bacon will leave for Lunenburg Courthouse to-morrow morning and will travel all the way, a distance of seventy-five miles, in the wagon in which he brought the prisoners here. The regular monthly meeting of the County Court of Lunenburg county will open on the 8th of July, but Deputy Bacon says he does not think that the alleged murderers of Mrs. Pollard will be arraigned for trial until the August term of the court.

A thanksgiving service under the auspices of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Young Men's Christian Association was held at the Academy of Music to night and was largely attended. There was singing and an address by Rev. H. W. Battle, D. D., pastor of the First Baptist Church.

BREAKFAST.—Wheatena, Baked Egg, Sliced Beef, Warm Toast, Orange Marmalade, Walrus, Maple Syrup, Coffee.

DINNER.—Fried Chicken, Mashed Potatoes, Peas, Lettuce, Currant Jelly, White and Graham Bread, Strawberry Ice Cream, Spruce Cake.

STRAWBERRY ICE CREAM.

One quart strawberry, one pint cream, one pint milk, one and one-half cups sugar, one-half cup cream, put one cup sugar over strawberries and let the juice run; then strain through a cheese cloth, pressing hard. Pour milk over paste and let stand a few moments, press hard until nothing is left in cloth but a ball of seeds. Mix the juice and cream together, and be sure it is sweet enough. Freeze and let ripen 25 hours.
