**THE GREAT WILD WEST**

Buffalo Bill's Congress of Rough Riders of the World.

**EXHIBITION VIEWED BY THOUSANDS**

The Story of the Mammoth Show in This City Was Profitable—A Grand Street Parade—Many Excursionists Came to Town to See the Indians—Story of the Show.

Buffalo Bill and his "Congress of Rough Riders of the World" arrived here early yesterday morning, and gave a street parade and two exhibitions, all three events being witnessed by thousands of people. Greater Norfolk and all the surrounding country seemed to have turned out to see the great Wild West and its famous proprietor, himself the drawing card of the entire show. The tents were pitched in Huntersville, on the same ground they occupied two years ago. The tiers of seats were arranged on three sides of an immense square, while at the other end were the horse tents and canvas quarters of the rough riders. The space thus enclosed formed the scene of action for a series of brilliant and novel events, as hereafter will be related.

The crowd which lined the streets to witness the parade at 10 o'clock was largely taxed, the seating capacity of the Wild West's tents, which incidentally drove the street car employes to desperation by the very difficulty of properly reaping such a harvest of fares. Every car possessed by the company, aside from its suburban employes, was in service, and every car was packed like a box of human sardines, while perspiring and panting conductors fought their way through the solid mass of humanity after fares.

**THE PARADE.**

All along the route marked out for the morning parade crowds began to gather early, and it kept policemen busy to maintain route for pedestrians to pass along the sidewalks. Promptly at 10 o'clock the parade started. It was led by Colonel Cody, who drove a pair of fine horses. Following him, in order, came the Royal Irish Lancers, representatives of the British army, then came what to most people was the most interesting feature of the parade—the Indians—smeared with war paint and gaudy with feathers. Following these came the German Cuirassiers in their beautiful white uniforms and shining brass breastplates. The Russian Cossacks followed the German cavalrymen and then came more Indians, the Mexican "Greasers," the Asiatic Arabs, cowboys from the plans of the La Plata and their hardy brethren from our own Western plains.

Following these and sitting with soldierly ease and dignity upon their fine horses, their yellow plumes waving and the brilliancy of their side arms reflecting the sunlight, rode the representatives of the pride and glory of American arms—a detachment of the Sixth United States Cavalry and closely after the troop came a battery of two guns, from Battery D, Fifth United States Artillery. The brass howitzers were drawn by six horses each and had a full service complement of gunners and privates. The representatives of our army were loudly cheered as they passed along.

**THE PERFORMANCE.**

The afternoon and evening performances were witnessed by at least 28,000 persons. Excursionists had poured train-load after train-load into the city all day long, and half the population, it seemed, turned out to see the Wild West.

The performance was opened with a grand review, the various detachments riding in at full speed and taking their alignment in front of the central tier of seats with marvelous accuracy. The Indians came in first and their picturesque head dresses and brightly painted limbs and bodies made a never-to-be-forgotten picture.

The leader of each subsequent detachment came in with the flag denoting his nationality. Last of all came Buffalo Bill himself. He rode in on a beautiful horse and looked the picture of health and manly vigor, as riding to the front, he bowed with that well known sweep of his broad-brimmed sombrero, and then introduced his Congress of Rough Riders of the World.

**A GREAT SHOW.**

To adequately describe Buffalo Bill's Wild West in all varied details of its scope and content of his central tier of seats was very much the same as when it was here last, two years ago. Albeit it has in no wise degenerated, but has gained some splendid attractions. The drill of the United States Artillery is a new feature, which was thoroughly enjoyed yesterday. The battery came in at a gallop, the men sitting statue-like with folded arms on top of cussion and carriage. At the word of command the horses wheel the pieces into line, the troopers dismount so quickly that one loses sight of the fact that they are riding. The result of mathematical calculation and training. The pieces are unlimbered, trained and fired and then the caissons are quickly brought up, coupled to the guns and the horses are galloping away even as the men resume their seats. A full service charge was fired yesterday and there were many in the audience who enjoyed the novelty of hearing for the first time the roar of a cannon.

Miss Annie Oakley, the celebrated shot, gave a wonderful exhibition of her skill in the use of fire arms, and Johnnie Baker emptied several pistols and magazine rifles while breaking glass balls, of which he missed only three. He feally ended by standing on his head and breaking several balls without miss.


Then there was a horse race between Indian boys, an exhibition of the old pony express by which mail was sent across the continent in '49. The Cossacks gave an exhibition of feats of horsemanship, hanging from their animals' necks, etc., and then some remarkable feats of strength were shown by the Arabs. The use of the lasso in catching wild horses was demonstrated. A hurdle race was a most interesting feature, the horses taking the bars easily and gracefully. 
