## SENATOR BUTLER MAD

### Attacks the State Committee for Its Decision Against Fusion.

## A DESPERATE CRIMINAL CAPTURED

### Burglar "Young" Safely Behind the Bars—Langdon, the Forger, Arrives and Committed to Jail—Government Convicts to Be Quartered at the Penitentiary.

Raleigh, N. C., March 3.—(Special)—This morning Oscar J. Spears took the oath of office as Assistant United States District Attorney, Clerk Fortune, of the District Court, administered the oath. It is not yet known when Ed. A. Johnson, colored, will be appointed Second Assistant District Attorney. He is promised the place, but does not appear to be sure of it. Senator Butler attacks the Democratic State Committee for its decision that the address of National Chairman Jones was not a declaration for fusion and for dropping the party's name. It is a comment of most of the Democratic State papers that the committee did not go further and make an absolute statement, officially, of its position, instead of leaving it for the members to make the denial that it endorsed either fusion or the dropping of the party name.

The Southern railway files a vigorous exception to the order of the Railway Commission reducing passenger rates, and demands a hearing in that matter.

The following represent North Carolina at the Pure Food Congress: A. Q. Holliday, W. A. Withers, J. L. Ramsey, J. C. L. Harris, J. B. Lloyd and B. Anderson.

Denial is made of a current statement that any selection of a president of the Atlantic and North Carolina railway has been made. It is asserted that there will be no appointment until September 1st.

It is proposed that there shall be this year an encampment of the Farmers' Alliance at its headquarters, near Hillsboro, and Col. Julian S. Carr has tendered the use of his "Oceonecteech" farm there.

It is regarded as probable that the Baptist State Sunday School Chautauque will be held at Shelby this year.

Farmers are reported to be well up with their work. There was never a better season for work.

The Petersburg detective who came here to identify the burglar "Young" saw the latter in jail, and at once said: "He is the man wanted at Petersburg. He shot at me twice." He warned the authorities to watch the man and prevent an escape. Young is a desperate criminal. He declined to say a word to the Petersburg officer, but coolly, "I guess I will go on with my walk," and then went up and down the corridor. His partner, who is in Petersburg, sent him his regards by the detective.

John Langdon, the forger, got here at 2 o'clock this morning from Norfolk and was kept in the station-house until noon, when he was transferred to jail. His attorneys here to induce the man he swindled here to agree to a compromise for \$200. Governor Russell insisted on having Langdon and sent a strong telegram to the Governor of Virginia. The officer who was sent after Langdon was not permitted to see him until yesterday. Then he agreed to come without requisition.

Convicts from nine States are to be sent to the penitentiary here by the Government, which will pay 25 cents a day for their maintenance. They will be kept in a special division of the cell blocks. Judge Burnell recommended this penitentiary as being spacious and convenient and as offering special facilities for employment.

During the month of February reports so far received show that there were thirty-four captures of illicit distilleries in this district.

Revenue Collector Duncan said today: "I think there will be a modification of the civil service law, in accordance with the recommendation of the heads of departments, made three months ago; that these will affect this district and cover all the field deputies. There is some question as to the clerks. The modification asked for covers deputies."

It is the plan to have three regiments of the State Guard at Charlotte May 20th.

The Western Mutual Life Association of Chicago to-day applied for license to do business in this State.

## RESPECT TO GEN. TALLAFERRO'S MEMORY.

Memorial Services at the State Female Normal School, Farmville, Va.

Farmville, Va., March 2.—(Special)—Memorial services were held this morning in the Assembly Hall of the school to express the profound sorrow of the faculty and pupils at the death of Gen. William B. Taliaferro, late president of the Board of Trustees. The exercises were opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. Harding, of the Presbyterian Church. Col. Fitzgerald delivered an address setting forth the many virtues of General Taliaferro as a scholar, soldier, and statesman. He was followed by Dr. Wilson, the physician of the school, in a feeling tribute to his memory. The following preamble and resolutions, presented by the committee, were adopted:

Whereas, General William B. Taliaferro was a member of the Board of Trustees of the State Female Normal School from its foundation until a few weeks ago and through nearly all these years was its interested and efficient President, and

Whereas, His work for the school and wide influence has secured to it from the first a larger patronage from his section of the State than elsewhere, and

Whereas, Further, the courtly manners and knightly bearing of our distinguished friend, whose death we mourn, exemplified the polished gentleman and the soul of honor, linking us to the glorious past, and presenting for imitation a noble type for the present, therefore,

Resolved, (1) That with loving appreciation and devoted gratitude for the long and useful life of our deceased friend, we feel a sense of our personal loss in his death.

(2) That we recall with pleasure his prominence and promotion in military and civil life, his honor in the political arena, his unswerving judicial career and above all his interest in the cause of education.

(3) That we are deeply grateful for the impress he has made on humanity as a man greatly honored by his fellows, and yet one who for long years exercised a simple faith in the Savior of Men, and trusted Him until the end came.

(4) That a copy of this preamble and these resolutions be sent to the sorrowing family, furnished to the press, and presented at the next meeting of the Board of Trustees to be spread on their minutes.

## GAVE NOTICE OF AMENDMENT.

Washington, D. C., March 3.—Several Senators to-day gave notice of amendments they will offer to the sundry civil appropriation bill providing for important improvements in rivers and harbors, the most important of which was one by Senator Morgan appropriating \$200,000 for work in Mobile Bay and one by Mr. Kenney appropriating \$100,000 for improvement of the inland waterway from Chimneycooke Bay, Virginia, to Delaware Bay, Delaware.

## AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND RE-ENACT SECTION 22 OF CHAPTER 21 OF THE CITY ORDINANCES, 1894.

Be it ordained by the Select and Common Councils of the City of Norfolk, that Section 22 of Chapter 21 of the City Ordinances, 1894, amended and re-enacted to read as follows: Whenever a person shall die, in the City of Norfolk, it shall be the duty of the physician attending such person during his or her last illness (or the Health Officer or the Coroner of the city, when the case comes under their official cognizance) to furnish, free of cost, and deliver to the undertaker, or other person superintending the burial of the deceased, a certificate, duly signed, setting forth, as far as the same may be ascertained, the name, age, color, sex, nativity (including State or country, name of parents, occupation, social relation, duration of residence in the city, cause and date and place of death, giving street number, and duration of last sickness, of such deceased person.)

And it shall be the duty of the undertaker, or other person in charge of the burial of such deceased person, to state in said certificate, the place and date of burial, and, having signed the same, to transmit it, within twenty-four hours after the death of said person, to the registrar of vital statistics, who will furnish him with a burial, or transit permit, for which a fee of fifty cents (burial, and one dollar transit) will be required. (The fee in the above instance to be waived in the case of a pauper. Any person violating this section shall be fined not less than five nor more than ten dollars for each offense. If the deceased be a white pauper his burial shall be superintended by the keeper of Cedar Grove and if colored, by the keeper of Calvary cemetery.)


