POPULISTS TO CONFER

The Call Numerously Signed by Both Wings of the Party.

WILL BE HELD ON NEXT WEDNESDAY

The Party is Shaky and Will Talk Over the Situation, Also in Regard to Calling a State Convention—V. L. Lusk Says Ewart Was Never Licensed to Practice Law.

Raleigh, N. C., March 12.—(Special).—A call is made for a conference of Populists here next Wednesday. It is signed by members of both wings of that party, the Butlerites and the anti-Butlerites. One of the former is J. Y. Hainrick, State Labor Commissioner. He said today that all sorts of Populists had made the call and that all sorts will attend the gathering. He added, "We will talk over the situation and see whether the Democrats fall gobbie us up or not. We will also see about calling a State Convention. The party is shaky; that is a fact. It looks like it will divide and part go to the Democrats and the other part to the Republicans." Hainrick is a member of the Populist State Committee.

V. S. Lusk, of Asheville, spent some time making inquiry as to whether H. G. Ewart had ever been licensed by the Supreme Court of this State to practice law. Lusk declares Ewart never was licensed. In view of this fact, it is regarded as singular that Lusk should three years ago have worked so hard to have Ewart made a Judge of the Western Criminal Circuit. Ewart is not a native of this State, but of South Carolina. Lusk is now trying to defeat his confirmation as a Federal Judge.

The State today chartered the Republic Publishing Company, of Rockingham, Richmond county, capital, \$1,500. It will publish a Republican paper and D. M. Morrison, H. C. Dockery, A. S. Dockery, Claudius Dockery, John P. Carriger, M. S. Johnson and M. H. Quick are among the stockholders.

Several hundred shrubs and plants from the nurseries at Baltimore have arrived here, the gift of George Vanderbilt to the State. It is stated that all will be set out in the grounds of the Executive Mansion and none in the Capital Square. Vanderbilt's gardener will supervise the work.

The new building at the State School for deaf mutes at Morganton will be 180 feet front and three stories in height and will cost \$17,000.

Rev. J. W. Jenkins, a local Methodist preacher, is dangerously sick with erysipelas at his home, Cary.

Track laying on the new Mowerville-Moocksville short cut of the Southern railway is expected to begin by the end of next week.

It is asserted that the suspension of the negro organ, the Gazette, in this city, has added to the loyalty of the Republican-Populist leaders, who are planning fusion. That paper was a factor in holding the negroes to fusion with the Populists.

Miss Eva Belle Simmons, the only female graduate of Wake Forest College, who died suddenly yesterday at Eufaula, Ala., will be buried at Wake Forest. She was given a degree, although she stood at the head of the class. Her father, Thomas J. Simmons, is president of the college at Eufaula.

OLD VIRGINIA SECURITIES
