LOCAL BREVITIES.

MR. CHARLES NORDHOFF, of the New York Herald, is in the city visiting friends.

MR. JOHN GROSSIUS, President of the Work-house Directors, was yesterday re-elected by the Board.

MR. ALFRED HILL was awarded the contract for the Columbia school-house by the Board of Education last night.

CHAS. VICKERS, residing at 292 Walnut street, lost a suit of clothes this morning by the manipulation of a sneak-thief.

The district supplied by the Eden reservoir with water has been limited to Third street on the south, and Central avenue, up to Findlay street, on the west.

MRS. FANNY BROWN HAVEN, the mother of Augustus and Jas. L. Haven, of this city, died shortly before midnight last night, at her residence in Avondale, in her eightieth year.

FIVE thoroughbred racers, among which are some of Kentucky's best stock, arrived from Louisville yesterday afternoon and were reshipped in the evening on the A. & G. W. railway for Saratoga.

A HORSE and wagon loaded with meat and vegetables was stolen this morning from the corner of Ninth and Harriet streets. The wagon belonged to Mr. A. Bein, who was temporarily absent at the time of the theft.

MARGARET MURPHY, an old rag picker, died yesterday in a garret at 295 Elm street. Coroner Maley held an inquest and the jury rendered a verdict of death from heart disease. A daughter of the deceased is living at Pomeroy, O.

THE Committee on Buildings was authorized at the meeting of the Board of Education last night to appoint an Assistant Superintendent of Buildings at a salary not exceeding \$100 per month, to be employed whenever required.

MR. D. C. FITZMORRIS, for two years past a STAR local, has accepted a position on the editorial staff of the Louisville Times and left last night to enter upon his duties. Fitz's numerous friends in the city will wish him success in his new field of labor.

WM. J. DEWSTER and Henry Howard were arraigned in the Police Court this morning, and adjudged guilty of obtaining a small keg of beer and 97 cents in change from a saloon keeper. They were each sentenced to ten days' Work-house and fined to the amount of \$10 apiece.

A COMMITTEE of five, consisting of Messrs. Merrill, Brown, Flinn, Mackey and Wulstun, was appointed to investigate the charges made against members of the School Board in some of the newspapers, and against a former member for the sale of furniture, the property of the Board.

JOHN SCHNEIDER, a tailor, working in Geyer's building, on Court street, was sent to the Work-house this morning by Judge Lindeman for ten days and fined \$10. John, yesterday, went into Robertson & Scherer's hat store, on Pearl street, and attempted to depart with two hats, but was caught in the act by the clerk of the firm.

JAS. SHANNON, whose accomplices for the late tobacco larceny on the Big Sandy pocket steamer Wildwood were sent to the Work-house, was arraigned in the Police Court this morning on the same charge. Shannon appropriated two dollars' worth of tobacco, and for this offense Judge Lindeman this morning sentenced him to thirty days' Work-house and a fine of ten dollars.

Old Industries.

One of the myriad singular industries pursued by the ingenious Parisians is that of fattening snails for the market. That the demand for this article of diet is large, is proved by the fact that a great number of persons find employment in furnishing an adequate supply. Most snail-breeders, who carry on their business outside of the "barriers" of Paris, fatten the mollusks in tanks, but some prefer to keep the creatures in the open air. The preserve in which snails are fed is divided into eight or ten separate enclosures, each of which is surrounded by a line of sawdust four inches broad, and fresh laid each morning.

This simple ledge is an essential part of the snail-park, where they are provided with an abundance of food, consisting of cabbage, lettuce, endives, thyme and vine leaves. Purified by their long fast, the snails eat with voracity, and in eight or ten days are fat enough to satisfy the eye and taste of a Parisian epicure.

The tax upon a fat snail is small, but it is estimated that were the levy to be raised to one-quarter of that set upon oysters, and fifty snails to be counted as one dozen bivalves, the revenue annually arising from their consumption in Paris would amount to 200,000 francs.

It is stated that a diet of snails reduces a man's flesh until he becomes a mere skeleton. The edible snails of the Gold Coast has a shell three inches long by two inches deep. From this she protrudes a pair of tentacles which are the choice part of the animal, and are served whole in that savory compound called snail soup.

Fishing is also an extensive industry in France, and is mostly pursued by women. The shrimps are plentiful on sandy shores, and the fishers wade knee-deep into the sea, pushing before them a net in the form of a wide-mouthed bag sewed around a hoop and fastened to the end of a pole by means of a cross-piece. A bag tied around the waist receives the animals as they are caught. In winter the shrimps retire to deeper water, and in there captured in nets drawn by boats.

These nets are now made of galvanized wire, which resists the action of the water and is a great improvement upon twine. Shrimps are sometimes left by the retreating tide in sandy pools, and when alarmed will bury themselves in their fan-like tail. In feeding they grasp their prey by the short, rake-like appendages between the claws proper and the tail, and pass it along up to the mouth, and so on to the mouth.

The choice between shrimps and snails is a mere matter of taste. Many persons who partake of the one reject the other with loathing, but there seems in fact no reason why both are not as cleanly and wholesome as the oyster.
