MADRID, July 15.--Official advices received by the Government report that the Carlists are surrendering in large numbers. The Carlist army officers are becoming discouraged and their forces demoralized.

VIENNA, July 15.--Emperor William has arrived at Salzburg. His reception by the people was most enthusiastic.

FEARS OF FRESHETS.

LONDON, July 15.--Violent rains have prevailed throughout England for several days past, causing serious injury to the crops and damage to property. The rivers are rising rapidly, causing apprehensions of disastrous freshets in the country.

A FAILURE.

The meeting called by the Radical club for last night at Trafalgar Square, to protest against the grant for the Prince of Wales' Indian journey, was a failure.

OUR RIFLEMEN.

The American Team arrived in this city last night and proceeded quietly to their hotel. They will decide to-day on the latest proposition of the Council of the National Rifle Association.

FROM SPAIN.

Advices from the Spanish frontier, received by the way of Bayonne, report that General Dorregary, being unable to penetrate into French territory, has turned back in the direction of Barbastro. Six officers and 172 men belonging to his rear guard were compelled to take refuge in France, near Gavarnie. They were promptly arrested by the French authorities, disarmed, and interned. Troops have been sent from Pau to guard the frontier. Don Carlos is at Villa Real with a strong force.

POLITICAL.

MADRID, July 15.--It is asserted that the article of the new Constitution embodying the principle of religious liberty will be supported when it comes up for final action in the Constitutional Committee by a vote of 23 to 19.

The Imperial states that the Diplomatic Agent of China is coming to Madrid, and that Chinese Consuls will be appointed in Cuba.

INCognito.

MUNICH, July 15.--The Emperor William, traveling strictly incognito, arrived here yesterday afternoon on his way to Salzburg.

Leader and Price Indicted.

New York, July 15.--The Brooklyn Grand Jury to-day found indictments against Joseph Loeder and John J. Price, charging them with perjury.

A HOTEL CRASH.

KILLED AND WOUNDED BY THE COLLAPSE OF A BUILDING.

LYNCHBURG, VA., July 15.--A portion of the City Hotel building suddenly gave way yesterday, and fell in with a crash. The dining-room was completely demolished. Several persons were caught by falling timber. Had the disaster occurred at meal time it would doubtless have been attended with great fatality. The following were the casualties: Mrs. Brown killed instantly by a crushing blow on the temple; Mr. Harris badly injured, but was saved by his mattress from the heavy timber. The body of a colored child was found smashed to a jelly. Everyone has left the building, as the remaining portion is considered insecure. The loss on the building and furniture is about \$2,000.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.

ANNUAL SESSION OF THE NATIONAL DIVISION.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 15.--The thirty-first annual session of the National Division of the Sons of Temperance of North America met here yesterday. The attendance was quite large and the day was occupied in addresses and routine business. Brother Strahan, of London, was introduced. The Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand after all expenses of \$2,844 69. The report of the Grand Scribe, Mr. Hodges, shows a gain of six thousand members during the year.

The organization is shown to be prospering in the various States, and its financial condition is satisfactory and improving. The address of the Most Worthy Patriarch reviewed the progress of the order, both here and in other countries. He devoted considerable space to the question of prohibition.

In the evening a reception was held at Music Hall, when addresses were made by F. M. Bradley, of Washington, D. C., Rev. H. W. Conant, State Temperance Agent of Rhode Island, and others.

On Friday a mass meeting of all the Temperance orders in New England will be held at Oakland Beach.

LOSSES BY FIRE.

TWO THEORIES.

BOSTON, MASS., July 15.--There are two theories as to the cause of the fire yesterday, which destroyed the boarding-house of seventy-four laborers at the Water-works at Lawrence and burned two men to death. One of the theories is that the fire was caused by trouble between the families of Patrick McCarty and Charles Lee, who had charge of the shanty last evening. Mrs. Lee left the city, and the fact that the fire was first seen in Lee's bed-room and the only property saved was Lee's trunk, threw suspicion on Lee, who has been arrested. The other theory is that one of the laborers set the building on fire.

OTHER FIRES.

DETROIT, MICH., July 15.--The residence of Daniel Gooden was damaged \$25,000 worth, by an incendiary fire yesterday.

An Ovid special reports the destruction by fire of Bentley's saw mills, in Gratiot county, with 500,000 feet of lumber. Loss \$10,000. Uninsured. Pardee, Cook & Co., of Chicago, lost 600,000 feet of lumber.

VEVAY, IND., July 15.--The barn and farm implements of Joseph McLovey, five miles from this place, were burned Tuesday. Loss \$2,500; insured in the Aena for \$1,000. It was the work of an incendiary.

OXFORD, O., July 15.--A slight fire yesterday in Sheras & Bros' grocery was put out without much damage. It was the work of an incendiary and his plans were well laid.

SPORTING NEWS.

PIGEON SHOOTING.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 15.--There was a large attendance at the pigeon tournament at East Syracuse yesterday, and several good shots from abroad were present. The birds used were wild pigeons, in excellent condition, and the shooting was from plunge traps at 21 yards' rise. Out of the sixty men shooting only four killed ten birds each, and H. N. Sherman, of Beloit, Wis., won the first money (\$200) by making a clean score at 31 yards. C. F. Wheat, of Cleveland, O., won the second prize of \$100; Geo. Loddar, of Syracuse, the third, \$120; Jas. Manning the fourth, \$80; and Thos. Kimber the fifth, \$50. The shooting to-day will be by English rules.

The Flood.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 15.--Butcher's Run (Lehigh) City, overflowed last night during the heavy storm, and the water on East street was at one time three feet deep. Not much damage was done.

Iowa Barley.

DAVENPORT, IOWA, July 15.--It is estimated that the barley area in this country will yield two million bushels of the grain. A larger yield by at least \$400,000 bushels than that of any previous year. The area devoted to barley is considerably larger than ever before.

The Long Branch Races.

The Crops.

CAIRO, ILL., July 15.--The wheat crop has been successfully harvested in Southern Illinois and in Kentucky and Missouri. The yield is not as large as usual, but what there is excellent. Other crops are doing well, except fruit, which generally will not nearly reach the extent of former years.

Seriously Injured.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., July 14.--M. F. Collier, agent of the New York Underwriters' Agency, fell from his room in the second story of the Sherman House last night, sustaining serious if not fatal injuries. He is at the Surgical Institute.

Will Meet and Hunt for More Money.

DETROIT, July 15.--The friends of an increase in the volume of currency will hold a National Convention here August 25th, at which Gen. Butler, Hon. W. D. Kelly, Senator Gordon of Ga., and others will deliver addresses.

Arrived in Good Season.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 15.--Messrs. Sekiscurva and Iby, the Japanese Commissioners to the Centennial Exhibition, have arrived in this city, and will continue to reside here until the opening of the great Exposition.

Summer Legislation.

HARTFORD, CONN., July 15.--The project to redistrict the State, so as to make one branch of the Legislature represent the population, was hopelessly killed in the House yesterday. The House appointed a committee of six to investigate charges of corruption against members. The Senate passed a resolution in favor of winding up the American Life and Trust Co. by a vote of 11 to 9.

Centennial Representative--Destitution.

OTTAWA, ONT., July 15.--Hon. F. Just, Minister of Agriculture, will leave here to-day for the winter in connection with arranging for the representation of Canada at the Philadelphia Centennial. Owing to the failure of the Northern Carlington Railroad Company to pay its hands there is a great deal of destitution along the route of its line among farmers and laboring classes.

After the Victory the Honors.

SARATOGA, July 15.--Hon. S. W. Kellogg, member of Congress from Connecticut, made the presentation of the flags and medals to the victors in connection with the ball-room of Congress Hall last night.

He congratulated them on the victory achieved, and said no college regatta ever excited so much interest. Nothing pleased everyone so much as the great victory and good feeling that prevailed. New England felt mortified to have the honors go from them, but felt pleased that Yale had educated so many professors for Cornell, its youngest sister.

As the flags and caps were presented loud cheers were given. Kennedy, the winner of the single scull, was highly complimented for the pluck he exhibited after rowing in the University race to win and win singly.

Mr. Lurd, of Buffalo, a member of Cornell, said he had only voice left to thank all for their kindness to him and his brother. The crew then passed out of the hall under an arch of the college colors, held aloft by members of the regatta. The ball was very largely attended.

The Rich Embroilment Case--The Neil Divorce Suit, &c.

COLUMBUS, O., July 15.--The attorneys of H. S. Rich, charged with embezzling funds of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, while agent for that road here, some years ago, have brought suit against W. C. M. Baker, for the repayment of about \$3,400, which it is stated he won from Rich. Baker was also arrested yesterday on a charge of gambling, and his property to the amount of \$4,000 attached. He gave bail of \$800 to appear for trial at the Court of Common Pleas. Other gamblers who won the balance of this stolen money from Rich, have returned their part of the spoils to the company's agents.

A final decision in the Neil divorce case was given by Judge Green yesterday. The children are to remain with the father, except during the months of July, August and September, until they are ten and twelve years of age, and are to visit the mother once a week instead of three times, as under the former ruling of the Court.

Mr. Erhardt Stokes, a prominent brewer and one of our wealthiest German citizens, died yesterday at the age of 60. He took a leading part in the German revolutionary movements of 1848, and emigrated to this country soon after.

ANOTHER HERALD OPINION.

WHAT IT THINKS OF THE COURSE OF MR. BEECHER'S FRIENDS.

NEW YORK, July 15.--The Herald editorially depreciated demonstrations of Mr. Beecher's friends since the ending of the trial, and says: Their efforts to present him as a victim of wanton conspiracy do him infinite harm. It compels us to say that Beecher, judged by his own written and spoken record, is unworthy to preach the gospel.

The Beecher of old days is dead. He died under the pen and pistol of Frank Moulton when he signed the letter of contrition. This Beecher, whose speeches we read, is only the phantom who haunts Plymouth Church as the ghost of the banished king haunted the castle of Elsinore. His crown is tarnished, sceptre broken, and the glory of the past is uncareful. The highest office which love can bestow is to remember him only as he lived, and to turn in sorrow and shame from the unwholesome apparition which bears his name.

Of Great Interest to Mr. Jewell.

NEW YORK, July 15.--Wm. Cornell Jewell, who recently issued a circular calling for a National Independent Convention, to nominate a President and Vice President, publishes a card, in which he sets forth that the impression formed from the phraseology of the circular that he opposed Democratic principles and advocated a third term for General Grant, is incorrect, and that his purpose was to aid in securing a National party with a Democratic platform of the better days of the Republic.

Wm. Almemo, a Spaniard, was to-day sentenced to eight years' imprisonment in the State Prison for drugging and robbing Frank Eagle, a Mexican seaman.

NEW JERSEY MIDLAND.

A meeting of the first mortgage bondholders of the New Jersey Midland Company was held yesterday, when a statement was submitted showing the total liabilities of the road to be \$3,000,000; assets, \$2,522,000; first mortgage, \$380,000. A committee of seven was appointed to investigate the condition of the road.
