CARL SCHURZ is to speak in this city on Monday evening, September 27th, on the financial issues of the campaign. Work has been commenced on the Cincinnati & Westwood Narrow Gauge railroad. The new general use of the word "gushing," as a sneer for sentimentality and enthusiasm, is of sufficient significance to warrant a woman's attention. The term was first employed for all excessive expressions of admiration or appreciation, but is now applied to every body who, for a moment, permits warm feelings to enter into his judgment of men or things. In its now popular use it illustrates the spread and diffusion of that spirit of all admirers which holds itself aloof from the impulses and natural delights of the human heart. It signifies rager and hearty sympathy as weakness, and implies that cold reserve is superior and a generous appreciation. A term better calculated to repress impulse and encourage a spirit of cautious fact-finding could scarcely be invented. No man's courage could long endure the advice of "not to gush." No enthusiasm could survive many repetitions of this phrase into what is very popularly called a flagrant odd bath. To be accused of "gushing" is to be accused not merely

of foolishness, but of a very admissible, infantile, selfish variety of that offense, such as no one could endure to think himself guilty of. It would be better in popular admiration to be thought ignorant, or insensible, or even stupid, than to live for an instant under the suspicion of "gushing." Words are very potent things, and there is scarcely a virtue that would not succumb to the power of a good stinging epithet.—Apollon's Journal.
