Business and Political Notes

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—Gaxiola & Andrade, the Mexican commission merchants of this city, have suspended; liabilities \$180,000, assets \$100,000. The cause is the recent tightness of money. They will probably resume as soon as their creditors are heard from to grant extension.

Political rumors are afloat here of changes in Federal offices. Lagrange, Superintendent of the Mint, is to retire, and Wherton, formerly State Senator, will probably be his successor; Phillips, late Republican candidate for Governor, to be Collector of the Port, and the present Collector Shannon to take Sherman's office as Assistant Treasurer. There is much fluttering among office-holders. A special reported that Lagrange had sent in his resignation, but his friends have prevented acceptance. It is represented that Director Lindeman is dissatisfied with Lagrange.

LAST EDITION.

New York.

Wrestling Match—The Tweed Case—O'Connor Power—Morrissey—Henry Clews & Co.—From Havana.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—The great wrestling match between Prof. Wm. Milly and Andre Chrystol, a Frenchman, which has been pending some time and delayed owing to some difficulty in the placing of stakes in the hands of the final stakeholder, will probably take place next Tuesday or Wednesday, the only difficulty now being the finding of a suitable place to decide the match.

Regarding Tweed's case, in which the Supreme Court yesterday decided against a reduction of bail and furnishing a bill of particulars, Mr. Wheeler, of the prosecuting counsel, considered that no appeal can be taken from either decision. Immediate steps can be taken to bring Tweed to trial, probably during the month of November.

Tweed's counsel believe they can appeal from the decision respecting bail, but not on the bill of particulars. The defense will probably make an effort to have the decision on the question of bail referred.

O'Connor Power, member of Parliament from England, lectures at Cooper Institute this evening on "The condition of Ireland, socially, politically and industrially." He also lectures next Tuesday on "Irish members in the English Parliament," when he will enter into the Home Rule question.

He is stopping at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, and has received invitations to lecture from all parts of this country and Canada.

John Morrissey publishes a card this morning announcing his antagonism to Tammany Hall, and declaring he will not be a candidate for State Senator from the Fourth District.

The examination of B. H. Cheever & Co., as creditors of Henry Clews & Co., was continued by the Register in bankruptcy yesterday. Cheever testified to his connection with Clews & Co., and his efforts in Washington to secure the position of Government agent to the company. He testified to Judge Dent's connection with the house, and at first thought him a partner.

Learned afterward that he was to act as counsel for the agency in Washington. Clews offered him \$25,000 to come here to New York as counsel. Dent was to furnish such counsel as would advance the interests of Clews. Mr. Cheever could not remember specifically what legal services Dent performed, and did not know that he ever ceased to have an interest in the business.

A private letter from Havana says the Spanish transport Cornillas arrived at that port September 26, with the first installment of five thousand men, to be sent by the Spanish Government to reinforce the regular army in Cuba.

The Cornillas landed nine hundred Carlist prisoners, who were marched to the garrison guarded by a force of one thousand marines and two hundred of the regular army, who returned to Spain in the transport.

Washington.

About Cigar Boxes—Gen. Boynton after Sherman's Memoirs.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The Attorney General has been called to decide a knotty problem. The existing law requires that all cigar-boxes be stamped in letters produced by a burning rod of iron, with the name of the manufacturer and the location of his collection district. Quite recently tin and paper boxes have been largely used by manufacturers. They claim that to comply with the law ruins the box as an impression is so light, if care is taken to prevent the destruction of the box, that the inscription is scarcely discernible. The Commissioner of Internal Revenue is of the opinion that a slack application of the law to such boxes is impracticable, and that he has no authority to allow a substitute to be used; but he has asked the Attorney General if he has such a right.

An extended review of General Sherman's Memoirs? based on contemporary records of the War Department, is soon to appear, an announcement to that effect having reached here to-day. For the purpose of making this compilation, a full access was granted the author to all the records in the Department. It is by General H. V. Boynton, and will be issued on the 20th.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The withdrawal of United States bonds deposited with the Treasurer, to secure National Bank circulation for the fifteen months ending September 30 amounts to \$19,000,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 7.—The Board of Auditors, of the District of Columbia, have suspended further issue of 65 bonds for the present. The total amount issued will not exceed twelve million.

Senator Cameron arrived here this evening.

End of the Rufer Trial.

A VERDICT OF MURDER IN THE SECOND DEGREE.

A \$15,000 Fire.

EVANSVILLE, Oct. 7.—The brewery of Kothe & Habbe was totally destroyed by fire last night; also the residence of Mr. Kothe, adjoining. Loss, \$15,000; insurance, \$8,000.

Failure of John Gorham.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—John Gorham, of the Gorham Silverware Company, has failed for \$600,000. The cause is said to be speculations in gold mines. The Treasurer of the Gorham Manufacturing Company says the concern will not be affected by his failure.

Preparing for a Great Reception.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 7.—We are to have Moody and Sanker, and a building to accommodate nine thousand people. John Wannamaker is at the head of the movement to secure all this.

General Court-martial at Newport.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—A general Court-martial has been ordered to meet at Newport Barracks, Ky., on the 14th inst., for the trial of such prisoners as may be brought before it.

The Court is to consist of Major T. C. Mason, Twenty-first Infantry; Patrick Cusack, Ninth Cavalry; T. Morris, Twenty-fourth Infantry; J. M. Thompson, Twenty-fourth Infantry, and Assistant Surgeon T. A. Owen; Judge Advocate, Lieutenant B. D. Graves.

At Friar's Point.

MEMPHIS, Oct. 7.—In the fight at Friar's Point eight negroes are reported wounded, and one white man, Sheriff Jones is also wounded. At Johnston, fourteen miles east, negroes are reported to be reorganizing, business is suspended and signals are going from the hill counties of both sides of St. Helena. There has been no new fighting to-day. The war grew out of the Ames antagonism in Cochrane county, about local offices, and a personal difficulty between Alcorn and Sheriff Brown, who denounced each other. The war is now believed to be over.

Late Foreign News.

RATE ADVANCED.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—The bank rate has advanced to 2 1/2 per cent.

TURKEY'S FINANCIAL EMBARRASSMENT.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—A dispatch received here this morning from Constantinople says the Turkish Government has announced its inability to redeem the government bonds, but offers to compromise by the payment of one-half in cash and half in new five per cent. bonds.

DOMINION MATTERS.

MONTREAL, Oct. 7.—Two French gentlemen named Drs. George and Panet left town Wednesday to fight a duel. They fought it out with swords, according to French rules, and the latter was badly but not dangerously wounded. The duel was fought near Ogdensburgh.

TORONTO, Oct. 7.—Two sailors went out in a boat last evening, and breaking an oar, the boat became unmanageable in the heavy sea, and it is believed both were drowned.

The body of a young man, supposed to be one of the three that were lost in a yacht some weeks ago, was found on the shore of Humber Bay to-day.

WHITBY, ONT., Oct. 7.—The Whitby & Point Parry Railroad engine-house, containing the locomotive and machinery, was totally destroyed by fire. Loss, \$10,000.

GREEN BAY, ONT., Oct. 7.—Charles B. Twerand's farmers' tool manufactory and saw mill, burned yesterday. Loss, \$10,000.

HALIFAX, Oct. 7.—Charles Macaulay, of the French Cross-Isle, was killed Friday by being thrown from a wagon.

The late gale was severely felt in Newfoundland on the coast, and some fishing boats were lost. The coasting steamer Oriol was wrecked near Rio bay on the 12th. The crew was saved.

The fishing on Newfoundland shore and Labrador for the present year will not amount to half the catch of last year. Distress is feared in some of the fishing settlements during the coming winter.

WHAT THE PORTE WILL DO.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 7.—The Porte, acting under a vote of England, has refused to accept any further intervention in the Herzegovinian trouble. The insurgents have been offered general amnesty, if they will lay down their arms.

FROM SPAIN.

A dispatch from Bayonne states that Alfonso has offered Don Carlos an ample annuity, payable from the Royal Exchequer, with the title rank of an Infant, if he will cease war. The offer has been refused by Don Carlos, who has intimated his determination to continue war to the end.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—The operations of the circular recently issued respecting the surrender of fugitive slaves from English vessels, has been suspended by the Board of Admiralty.

FLASHES.

The Tennessee Conference of the M. E. Church is in session in Nashville.

The Trustees of the Peabody Educational Fund are in session in New York.

The modified epizoot has appeared in Chicago, and many horses are suffering. The Pittsburg Exposition will open on Saturday morning. The street parade will take place to-day.

The first of a series of four races, was won by the Estelle by one minute on time allowances.

Most of the valuable bank letters sent from the Providence Post-office to Boston, Saturday night are missing. A similar wholesale loss of bank letters sent to Boston occurred on the last of July, and smaller losses twice since.

Galveston is recovering from the effects of the inundation. The harbor has been benefited by the storm, and ships can now come to the wharf without lightning. Business is reviving and contributions are coming in from all sections.
