On inquiring of the neighbors he was advised to take \$10 for the whole concern—it he could get it. He returned to his home and arrived just as the purchaser, a fellow named Martin, who used to keep a little tin shop on Main street, got there. A fight of course ensued, but poor Miller got the worst of it, and finally "the strike his tent like the Arabs, and silently stole away."

Theatrical Notes. "Shoot 'em," is the watchword at Wood's this week. Miss De Forrest's "Lady Teazle" was a pronounced success. Miss Montague is the operatic star that rules supreme to-night. The Galt House is the "head center" for the theatrical profession at present. Seats for the opera to-night are selling very rapidly, considering that it is an "off-night." The rain has not dampened the spirits of our lovers of music, judging by the large crowd in attendance at the Grand last evening. Frank Frayne is making up a combination to take with him on his tour through the East. The season will last nearly nine weeks. The ushers at the Grand Opera-house have fitted up a neat little room in the corner of the hall, just to the right of the door, to be used as a hat and coat room, on the plan that is in vogue in the East. It is a capital idea, especially in wet and nasty weather, such as we are now having. The boys did a thriving business last night.

Serious Charge Against the Mayor. John Borgman, who lives at the head of Fifth street, is the proprietor of several night carts. By order of the Board of Health he has been arrested several times on the charge of operating them without having obtained a deodorizing machine. (The machine is pronounced a humbug by three members of the Board.) On the first trial the jury found him not guilty. On the trial of the second charge, without a jury, he was fined \$3 and costs, "on an agreed state of facts." His counsel, T. C. Campbell, moved for a stay of execution for the purpose of applying for a writ of error, so as to carry up as a test case. Borgman still continued his work, and was arrested the third time, which case is now pending. Again he was arrested and placed in the Station-house last night, and bail of \$200 in cash refused. He is a real estate owner. At the hearing of this last charge, this morning, before Judge Fiesemann, Mr. Campbell, on behalf of his client, used the following caustic remarks: "Your Honor, when common thieves, and men who have nearly taken the lives of others, are liberated on \$25 and \$100 bail, and persons who have followed a life of law-breaking for years in this city may be liberated in a similar manner, I think the keeping of this man among common criminals was a scandalous shame, a cowardly outrage." [Interruption by Officer Smith.—"It was done on an order of the Mayor."] "Then it is a double hardship. It shows the consequences of keeping in office a man who daily unites himself for his duties; who is daily under the influence of drink—(Court interrupts him). I admit it is pretty hard to have to express myself in such a manner of the chief magistrate of the city of Cincinnati, but you can see that a scandalous outrage has been perpetrated."

ONE PIECE STOVE-PIPE ELBOWS. (From the October Number of the American Artisan.) STOVE-PIPE ELBOWS, The Old and the New.

Every person is familiar with stoves and stove-pipes. Housekeepers, however ignorant of automatic pumps, gas machines, and the mysteries of burglar alarms, are posted on cooking and parlor stoves, with their adjuncts of pipes, elbows and dampers. The troubles with these, however, are frequently temper-trying and embarrassing, for good cooking and generous warmth both depend in a great measure upon the good condition of the necessary piping and elbows. The old fashioned square




Fig. 1. elbows have been in use for a long time in churches, halls, houses, and all kinds of buildings. Figures 1 and 2 illustrate them. We have inserted these representations in order that our readers may observe clearly the contrast between the old and the new form of elbows, shown by Figures 3 and 4. The old have done such good service for a hundred years and more that to find fault with them now, in order to extol the new corrugated elbows, which are being so rapidly, extensively and successfully introduced, seems to us like slighting the services of old servants who, with all their faults and troublesome peculiarities, we respect for their years.

But old contrivances must retire before the onward march of progress; and we introduce to the notice of our readers one of the very neatest and best improvements in sheet-metal elbows that has ever come under our notice. The improvements consist in having the elbows made curved and corrugated instead of square.




Fig. 2. The corrugations are necessary to their curved form, add to the strength, and we think, to the symmetry and beauty of the elbows. These elbows being made of ONE PIECE, cannot break or come apart, but will last until the iron is actually burned up. The common elbow, connecting a horizontal and a vertical pipe, as represented by Figure 1, finds a good substitute in the one shown by Figure 3, and the uselessness of the drop-elbow, Figure 2, is avoided in the corrugated drop-elbow, Figure 4; this shows how neat an attachment can be made by pipe between a stove and a wall. This elbow is adjustable to any variation in heights of stove-collar and fire-board, and a horizontal variation of six to eight inches, making an additional section of pipe unnecessary, giving perfect work, strong and handsome in every case. The two sections forming the connecting pipe drop-elbow are interchangeable.
