FROM THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

The Ship Winchester. National Associated Press to the Star. WASHINGTON, March 23.—A. M.—The observer at Cape Henry reports that the ship Winchester was last night driven high upon the shore and is now lying steady, without leaking, head toward the shore. No further damage is anticipated. One of the wrecking tugs has just arrived, but can not commence work immediately on account of the heavy sea, and has anchored off the ship. A majority of the crew remain on board the ship, there being no danger, and a life car is ready at a moment's notice.

The Old Southern Mail Contract Claims.

Congress at its last session passed an act providing for the payment of persons who were contractors for carrying mails in those of the Southern States that engaged in the Rebellion, for the period between their last settlement and before said States engaged in war against the United States.

The Sixth Auditor is at a loss to know what construction is to be put upon the phrase "Before said States engaged in war against the United States." The question arises whether as in some of the States aggressive acts preceded the passage of the ordinance of secession, and others the ordinance preceded any overt act. The one or the other should be accepted as the date, and also whether the ordinance, being a nullity, had the effect to place the State in a condition of war against the United States.

All services in the States were discontinued by the Postmaster General on the 31st of May, 1861, and service up to that time has been certified by the Post-office Department to this class of claimants to the amount of \$369,000, and it was doubled upon this date that Congress appropriated the \$375,000, or an amount thereof as may be necessary to pay the claims.

Lady Clerks.

Postmaster General Key has ordered that hereafter lady applicants for positions in the Dead Letter Office shall undergo an examination to determine their qualifications for the duties. This order had its origin in a protest from Gen. Barber, the Third Assistant, upon whom some females had been imposed that could scarcely write their own names.

A Cabinet Change Indicated.

Among the first places which common rumor assigned in President Hayes's then forthcoming cabinet, was that of Attorney-General, to Mr. McCrery, of Iowa.

The Remainder of the Ticket Nominated and the Convention Adjourned.

At 10 o'clock this morning Turner Hall was filled with city politicians and others to witness the struggle for the places on the Republican ticket, from that of Mayor to Wharfmaster.

The attendance from the start was large, and before the call to order was made the prospective candidates were as busy as bees, distributing their pastebords and working to make themselves solid with the delegates, of which there were two hundred and sixty-four.

The beautiful weather seemed to have an inspiring effect (beer didn't seem to flow with as much profusion as on similar occasions) upon the crowd, and the best of humor prevailed.

The offices to be filled at the election on the first Monday in April are as follows: Mayor, City Solicitor, Treasurer, one Judge of the Superior Court, Police Judge, Prosecuting Attorney of the Police Court, Director of the City Infirmary and Wharfmaster.

The personnel of the Convention was first class, and it was a subject of remark that some of the city's best citizens had been sent to labor for the nomination of a good, square popular ticket.

The usual amount of delay was experienced in seating the delegates (there being no mark of distinction on the chairs to enable the bewildered delegate to find his place) and in consequence it was nearly half an hour from the time Geo. Emg first rapped for "order," until quiet was restored by the Sergeants-at-arms, Frank Falke, Phil Emig, J. C. Jacoby, J. McCafferty and W. D. McKean, Jr.

At last—everything being ready for business, the names of Hon. Benj. Eggleston and Colonel T. C. Campbell were presented for Temporary Chairman, and on a vote of the house, Mr. Eggleston took the chair and spoke as follows:

"Gentlemen of the Convention—I am under obligations to you for this honor conferred and I assure you that it is a gratification to me not only to preside over this distinguished body for a short time, but for the opportunity it gives me to meet so many earnest and honest wheel-horses of the Republican party. For the last four or five months the country has been in a long continued strife, but now the right has been triumphant, and one of your old citizens has been called to the Chief Magistracy of the nation. [Applause.] To-day we are called upon to put in the field a ticket for our beautiful and great city, and it is our duty to place those men in nomination whom we can all support. Hoping that all we do will be done in harmony and in order, and that those who may be disappointed in their expectations will submit gracefully for the good of the whole party, remembering that time will make all things even, I thank you for this honor."

On motion Mr. John H. Wilkins was appointed Temporary Secretary, and W. S. Capellier, of the Twenty-fourth Ward, and Theodore Horstman, of the Thirtieth Ward, as his assistants.

Afternoon Proceedings.

Promptly on time, Chairman Eggleston called the Convention to order after the morning recess, and called for the report of the Committee on Permanent Organization, which was as follows:

Permanent Chairman—Judge M. B. Hagans.

Permanent Vice Presidents—Hon. Benj. Eggleston, Col. L. C. Weir, L. A. Staley, T. C. Campbell.

Permanent Secretaries—J. M. Waiters, F. W. Steigelman, F. J. Bricey, Judge Hagans coming forward, was introduced by the retiring Chairman, and spoke as follows:

"Gentlemen—I thank you heartily for the honor of being called upon to preside over your deliberations, and have two requests to make—first, that you will preserve order, and that the candidates and their friends will keep out of the aisles; and secondly, (and this by way of exhortation) that you will nominate a ticket to-day in accordance with the declared policy of President Hayes. [Applause.] I do not desire to take up the time of the Convention with further remarks, and will now proceed to business."

The other committees reported as follows: The Committee on Credentials through its chairman reported that there was no contest in any of the wards; a fact which speaks volumes for the Convention's unanimity.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was as follows: The interests involved in all our municipal affairs demand of this Convention and the Republican party of Cincinnati wisdom and unity in the selection and support of nominees from whom we exact the pledge of determined enforcement of all needed measures for the economical and honest management of our city government, and in their behalf we invoke and invoke the co-operation of all good citizens independent of political preference.

"Resolved, That the Republican party of Cincinnati in Convention assembled, having unlimited confidence in the integrity, ability and determination of purpose of President Rutherford B. Hayes, hereby endorse him as the true representative of the party and pledge to him its undivided and hearty support."

"Resolved, That we recognize and accept the present administration of the General Government as the true exponent of strict economy and genuine reform—the cardinal principle of the Republican party—and that the enforcement of the declarations of the letter of acceptance of President Hayes will insure to all sections of the Nation that lasting unity and peace essential for the prosperity and welfare of our whole people."

The Chairman of the Committee on Rules and Order of Business read the following, which was adopted:

NEWS FROM THE METROPOLIS

Still Looking for A. Oakley.

National Associated Press to the Star. NEW YORK, March 23.—The mystery of Ex-Mayor Hall's disappearance is still unexplained. No intelligence has been received from Mr. Hall as yet. The general impression at the police headquarters is that he has committed suicide, but the belief is settled among his friends that he has either gone away on business or is perpetrating a practical joke.

The World this morning publishes a statement regarding the disappearance of Ex-Mayor Hall, leading to the belief that he was murdered in Brooklyn. From this statement it appears Hall had been recently engaged as counsel in a divorce suit brought by a lady residing in New Jersey against her husband, and that Friday night last he went to Brooklyn to search for witnesses in the case. He had previously spoken to an acquaintance about having to visit an extremely respectable and dangerous locality in Brooklyn in connection with this suit, and it is known that when he left his office he had a considerable sum of money, at least \$500, on his person. The belief is expressed that in this locality he was waylaid, robbed and murdered. Detectives have been set to work to follow up this clue.

DISPATCHES FROM ABROAD

BERLIN, March 23.—There were fetes in this city and other places throughout Germany, yesterday, in celebration of the birthday of Emperor William. In replying to congratulatory addresses, the Emperor expressed confidence in a pacific solution of the Turkish question.

SPORTING NEWS.

Walking Match. National Associated Press to the Star. NEW YORK, March 23.—The fifty-mile walking match between Stubbs, of England, and W. E. Harding, the fifty-mile champion of America, took place at Gilmore's Garden. The start was made at 1:30 P. M. Stubbs was allowed one mile start. Harding gained the mile on his opponent between the eleventh and twelfth miles. On the thirteenth mile Stubbs, who was three miles behind, gave up.

FLASHES.

Boyd & Co., accused of whisky crookedness in New York, were acquitted. The barn of Mrs. Elizabeth Colver, near Springfield, Ohio, was burned yesterday.

The Versailles duel was squelched by a Mayor's proclamation, and the suit was taken the form of a libel suit.

An Akron (Ohio) dispatch says: Henry Gouler, of Coventry, while duck-hunting yesterday on Long Lake, by the common handling of his gun, shot himself in the arm, maiming it so that it became necessary to amputate it.

THE MOUNTAIN-MEADOW FIENDS.

Brigham Young Denies Preparation for the Execution of Lee. National Associated Press to the Star: NEW YORK, March 23.—The Herald this morning publishes a dispatch from Brigham Young, dated St. George, Utah, in which he says if Lee has made any statement in his confession implicating him (Young) it is utterly false.

The Herald special correspondent telegraphed from Cedar City, Utah, thirty-five miles south of Beaver City, the announcement that a change of programme was suddenly agreed upon Wednesday night by United States Marshal Nelson, who was preparing to leave Beaver City, having determined that the execution of Lee should take place on the very scene where the terrible massacre had been committed. Arrangements were soon completed, and shortly after sundown the cortege, headed by one hundred mounted troopers, followed by a covered wagon containing the prisoner, guarded on either side, and followed by about twenty cavalrymen, moved out of the gates of the Penitentiary at Beaver City.

The Marshal still feared attempts at rescue, and the removal of Lee was kept a profound secret. The distance to the place of execution is ninety miles. The party arrived at Cedar City at 2 o'clock yesterday morning, and after a short rest to obtain provender for the horses they again started.

The execution will take place soon after arrival on the scene of the massacre, probably before noon. It is not yet decided whether the firing party will be composed of Regular soldiers or Deputy Marshals, but it is supposed the military will only act to preserve the peace and prevent a rescue. The nearest point of telegraphic communication from the scene of Lee's execution is Cedar City, forty-five miles distant.

The Independent Greenback Party Rejected.

National Associated Press to the Star. PROVIDENCE, R. I., March 23.—The Independent Greenback party last evening nominated a State ticket as follows: For Governor, Wm. Foster, Jr., of Providence; for Lieutenant Governor, J. F. Hazard, of West Greenwich. No nominations were made for other State offices, these officers being no-part of it, and the present incumbents entirely satisfactory.

Gen. McClellan's Nomination Rejected.

National Associated Press to the Star. ALBANY, N. Y., March 23.—In the Senate yesterday afternoon the nomination of Gen. George B. McClellan for Superintendent of Public Works was rejected by a vote of 15 to 9.

CITY SOLICITOR

The following names were offered: Clement Bates, Drausin Wulsin and Bellamy Storer.

On the first ballot the vote stood: Bates, 124; Wulsin, 89; Storer, 41. No choice.

Mr. Bates was nominated on the second ballot, the vote standing: Bates, 145; Wulsin, 93; Storer, 12.

POLICE JUDGE

The names of Judge Walter F. Straub, Moritz Pohlmann and Judge George F. Lindemann were presented. On the first ballot Judge Straub was nominated, receiving 130 votes to Lindemann's 19 and Pohlmann's 103.

For PROSECUTING ATTORNEY POLICE COURT the names of John P. Murphy, John Goetz, Burr W. Blair, Thomas Shay and Clarence Morris were put forward.

On the first ballot the vote stood—Murphy, 110; Goetz, 44; Shay, 39; Cox, 24; Blair, 26; Morris, 12. After the announcement of the result, Messrs. Cox, Blair and Morris withdrew from the race and the second ballot was taken, resulting as follows: Murphy, 178; Shay, 37; Goetz, 31.

Mr. Murphy was declared the nominee, and, being called upon for a speech, said that he attributed his success to the fact that he was a member during the war of the old Fifth Ohio, and that on this very day fifteen years ago he helped to give Stonewall Jackson his first drubbing.

Since that time, said Mr. Murphy, I have been an earnest Republican. I hope I will add no weakness to the ticket at least, and will promise you that if elected I will do my duty to the best of my ability.

DIRECTOR OF CITY INFIRMARY

The following names were presented: Wm. Ohmann, J. A. Stevens, Abram Harris, Andrew Miller, Authur Hill and Col. S. H. Dunning.

On the first and only ballot Mr. Wm. Ohmann was chosen, having received 131 votes to Stevens' 13, Harris' 29, Miller's 10, Hill's 63, Col. Dunning's 7.

WHARF MASTER

Col. J. V. Guthrie, Alex. Kennell, E. F. Hopkins and E. S. Butler were named.

First Ballot—Guthrie, 123; Guthrie, 95; Hopkins, 13; Butler, 10. No choice. On the second ballot Kennell was nominated, the vote standing: Kennell, 143; Guthrie, 110; Hopkins, 1; Butler none.
