

LOCAL BREVITIES.

The United States Grand Jury will report next Saturday.

Mr. J. Webb, Jr., will contest the election of Mr. J. T. Allen, Alderman from the Eighteenth Ward.

The funeral of little Elsie Strunk, the two-year-old daughter of Sim. Strunk, Esq., took place this afternoon.

Alderman Julius Reis is of the opinion that the rules of the Board of Aldermen need a thorough overhauling.

The A. & G. W. Railroad ticket office has been removed to the northeast corner of Fourth and Walnut streets.

The Amazon Insurance Company, of this city, lost \$5,500, and the Germania \$2,500, by the burning of the Southern Hotel at St. Louis.

That part of Miles Greenwood's foundry on the west side of Walnut street, bounded by Jackson, Twelfth and Canal streets, is being torn down.

It is rumored that Sheriff Wallace has been indicted on the charge of aiding in the escape of Charles Young, an illegal voter. We'll know for sure next Saturday.

There were three hundred and thirty-five fire alarms in this city last year. Total loss, \$449,183.38. Insurance recovered, \$351,048.91. Loss in excess of insurance, \$98,134.44.

SAMUEL STICKNEY, who was arrested some days since and taken before Squire Thomas Elytt on the charge of obtaining money by false pretenses from a Mr. Swigert, was released this morning on a writ of habeas corpus.

D. DEWAR, C. C. Archer, Matthew Kelly, J. H. Burrell and W. J. Ludlow have associated themselves together and organized the East End Building Association No. 4. Capital stock \$500,000, divided into 4000 shares.

A HANDSOME Inland Brunswick & Balke cue, will be given as a prize to the best pool player for the highest number of points made in one game during the month at Henry Mollenkamp's place beginning April 12 and ending 28 inst.

EMANUEL LEWIS, a colored waiter employed at the Grand Hotel, died yesterday of typhoid pneumonia, at his home, corner of Longworth street and Central avenue. His wife has suspicions that her husband was poisoned by a mistake in a prescription, and has demanded an inquest.

The Queen City Club House, on the corner of Seventh and Elm streets, was entered by burglars last night or early this morning. The thieves effected an entrance through one of the front windows and carried off a large amount of silver ware.

The specifications for the Cincinnati Music Hall, under the new plans, are now ready at the office of the architect, Handford & Proctor, for examination by those desiring to bid. The specifications are for the brick work, iron work, rough masonry and freestone.

PACKAGES of season tickets to the Baseball Park for the season are on sale at Kramer's cigar-store and Aug's Club-house. These tickets admit the holder to the grand stand, and are good for any game of the season. One or more of them can be used at any game.

JACOB GARDNER, who is charged with destroying the ballot-box in the First Precinct of the Fourth Ward, appeared in the Police Court this morning and waived examination. He was bound over to the Grand Jury and his bail fixed at \$3,000, which was promptly furnished by Mr. J. C. Friedelayer.

SOME of our wealthy citizens, among whom are Archbishop Purcell, Reuben R. Springer, Geo. K. Suenberger, John Shoenberger, of Pittsburg; Theo. Cook, Jas. A. Frizor and lady, L. B. Harrison and Miss Antwerp, have made up a party for a trip to California. They propose to have their own car and make the trip some time next week.

THE Ohio & Mississippi Railroad recently took a car-load of dry-goods from a leading house in this city for Sherman, Texas, which was delivered in the latter city on the fifth day from its leaving Cincinnati. This is the fastest time ever made on freight from Cincinnati to Texas. The car went to St. Louis, and thence via the M., K. & T. R. R.

AT Greenwood Hall a fair for the benefit of the Church of the Presentation, Walnut Hills, is in progress every evening this week, when a contest is being waged between three young ladies for an elegant watch and chain presented by Rev. J. J. Kennedy. Mayor Johnston and his successor will be there to-night.

JOHN A. LOGAN, the bigamist, whose checkered life with a white wife and a colored one we detailed in yesterday's STAR, was rearrested last night on a warrant sworn out by wife No. 1, charging him with perjury in having falsely sworn in the Probate Court that he had no legal wife living at the time that he made application for a license to be married to Cora Williams, at present wife No. 2.

MICHAEL BECKLER and W. C. Wynne were arrested last evening at the instance of Jac. Kautner, who says that he was swindled out of \$3 in a scheme of chance. Beckler's alleged scheme is the selling of a photograph, which calls for a chrome or oil painting, at No. 185 Vine street. Kautner bought some of the photographs, but when he found that he did not get a chrome he swore out a warrant for the arrest of the two men. The case in the Police Court was continued till April 20.

JOSEPH BUCKELMEIER, a blacksmith, of Cumminsville, reported at the Tenth District Station, last night, that he had been robbed of \$60 in Leonard Grant's saloon. The police officers investigated the matter, and found that Buckelmeier, who was pretty drunk, had had a quarrel with his wife, and that, during the scuffle, she took the money from him for safe keeping. Buckelmeier, when he discovered that the officers knew the particulars of the theft, made his exit for fear that he himself would be arrested.

OFFICERS SEWENS and Voigt were accosted last night by a red-faced, large-eyed, tolerably well-dressed young woman, who told them that she was a stranger and had no place to go to, and requested to be taken to some lodging house, as she had money to pay for her accommodations. The officers took her to the Woodward House, No. 110 West Sixth street, kept by Mrs. M. A. Smith, where she was given a room. This morning at an early hour, she was missing, and with her went nearly \$30 worth of jewelry, which she grabbed up from a bureau drawer. She is still missing.

Sudden Death. Mr. L. Cable, aged fifty years, a resident of Blue Rock street in the Twenty-fifth Ward, Cumminsville, died suddenly in bed this morning. Deceased was a driver for the firm of J. J. de Tombe, coal and lumber dealers. He leaves a wife but no children. The coroner was notified, and will hold an inquest.

Boiler Explosion.

An engine on the Jeffersonville, Madison & Indianapolis Railroad exploded its boiler at Madison, Ind., yesterday, killing the engineer, John Lindley. The wounded were Jacob Hasafurder, of North Madison, a passenger on the engine, badly cut on the head and severely scalded; James Davis, section boss, passenger on the engine, severely cut on the head and badly scalded; Michael McLauzlin, fireman, right leg broken, scalded, body bruised and cut; James Davidson, Jr., scalded; James Hill, of North Madison, passenger on the engine, bad cut on the head and face mutilated.

Health Office Statistics.

The report for the month of March of the Health Office shows the following: Total deaths, 378; still-born, 23. Of the decedents, 266 were males and 172 females; white, 363; colored, 18; married, 147; single, 193; widowers, 17; widows, 20; not stated, 1. Natives of Cincinnati, 105; other parts of the United States, 71; Germany, 90; Ireland, 38; England, 3; other foreign parts, 4; not stated, 2.

The District Physicians made 1,723 visits during the month; patients treated, 472; discharged, 331; remaining, 27; died, 14.

There were 25 dairies inspected during the month; 14 in good condition, 9 fair, poor 2; cows inspected, 854; in good condition, 572; fair, 264; poor, 18. Samples of milk inspected, 278; standard, 265; below standard, 13; adulterations, Linderman & Mohrert, John Geyer, J. M. Kern, Thale & Wines, John Hare (died \$25 and costs), Banny Rilling, A. Kuecher, Wm. Myers, W. K. Wisn, Wm. Klesler.

Court Citings.

Catherine Wolfhorst against Jane M. Neski. This was a petition in error to reverse a judgment rendered in favor of the defendant to recover damages. Argued and submitted.

The Trustees of the Cincinnati Southern Railroad against O'Meara and others. In this case, a proceeding to assess the compensation to be paid the owners of property taken for the purpose of building the northern approach to the Southern Railroad Bridge, the jury returned an additional verdict yesterday afternoon, finding the amount to be paid to John F. Crawford for property taken and the damages to the portion not taken at \$3,000.

Eugene Bueckley & Co., the contractor for the improvement of the Walker Mill Road from East street to the Lower River Road, in 1872, yesterday brought suit against the city to recover \$31,704.

Leon H. Houston and Ace Gregg, assignees in bankruptcy of M. B. Wright, brought suit yesterday in the United States Circuit Court against Louis Golden, assignee of Amos T. Blessing to recover \$8,341.95 from defendant.

B. P. Critchell against J. S. Cook & Co. A petition in error to reverse a judgment rendered in favor of the plaintiffs below on a demurrer to the answer of the plaintiff in error. Argued and submitted.

Henry Pearce, administrator of E. B. Howells. A petition in error to reverse the judgment of the court below in finding the priority of liens in favor of the defendant in error, G. T. Jones. Argued and submitted.

The present misrepresentative of the Third Ward, in the Board of Aldermen, Mr. J. H. Dicks, would oblige his constituents by handing in his resignation as a member of that Board. Mr. Dicks has outlived his usefulness, and should withdraw in order to make room for a good Republican statesman.
