ROSENBERG'S RETREAT.

Too Much Town Talk Sends Him To Prison.

Sentenced To-day for Eighteen Months.

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Rosenberg, the publisher of the Town Talk, was brought up today at the old Bailey for sentence. His counsel made a fresh appeal for a mitigation of the penalty, urging in extenuation of the offense that Rosenberg had but followed the example of many articles in the weekly papers of London, who had not been punished for utterances which were as malicious and perhaps as false as those for which Rosenberg was about to suffer.

AB. BAGBY'S DEATH.

Horrible Fate of a Young Steamboat Engineer. BERLINGTON, Ia., Oct. 27.—Ab. Bagby, engineer of the steamboat Minnesota, while oiling the machinery, near Keithsburg, Ill., had his clothing caught, and was horribly mangled, dying in a few minutes. Bagby is believed to have come from Cincinnati, where his mother resides. Bagby was a young man highly esteemed in his profession, and came here from Ripley County, Ind. His mother resides at Cumminsville, Ohio, near Cincinnati, and his father, who was a well known and highly respected river engineer, died last summer in the hospital at Cincinnati of yellow fever contracted while on a voyage to Memphis.

HORRIBLE FATE OF FOUR MINERS.

The miners were crushed to death before any assistance could be rendered, although every effort was made to rescue them. Their bodies have been recovered.

LEXINGTONVILLE, Ill., Oct. 27.—Charles B. Rinehart, a clerk in Rabbitt's Hotel, at this place, while in a fit of delirium tremens, jumped from the secondary window of the hotel to the brick side-walk below and was instantly killed. For about a year past Rinehart has been a very heavy drinker.

SAD DEATH OF A YOUNG LADY.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 27.—Miss Lillie Dickey, daughter of the late Judge Dickey, of Lancaster, Pa., shot herself through the brain Friday night during a party at Judge Rea's, where she had been spending the summer. She died yesterday and her remains were sent to Lancaster. It is supposed the shooting was accidental.

GERMAN ORPHAN ASYLUM BURNED.

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—The German Catholic Orphan Asylum at Lake Hill, this county, burned to the ground yesterday. Loss, \$20,000. One hundred and fifty children are homeless until the new building, now in process of construction, is completed.

ELOPING PARTY IN JAIL.

ADRIAN, Mich., Oct. 27.—Chauncey Fairchilds, aged twenty-seven years, a farm hand, working for Wm. Jackson, at Wells ville, eloped with Kate, the seventeen-year-old daughter of his employer, on the night of the 21st, stealing sundry articles of personal property at the same time. On Monday night they were overhauled at White Pigeon and lodged in the County Jail. Fairchilds has a wife living in Cayuga County, N. Y.

GRATEFULLY TO ADAMS' CREDIT.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 27.—General Sherman thinks that the success achieved by General Adams in securing the unconditional surrender of the women of the White River Agency entitles him to great credit, even if he should fail in securing the surrender of the murderers. Judging from the success already met with, he thinks it would not be surprising if Adams brought in the murderers to be tried by civil tribunal.

A Sabbath of Murder and Meanness at Louisville. Specials to the Star. BURKHARDT BURGLARY.

Valuable Haul Through an Alley Window. Forty-five Hundred Dollars Worth of Fur Goods Stolen. Between dusk last evening and 2 o'clock this morning a heavy burglary was committed at Burkhardt's hat store on Fourth street. Mr. Burkhardt estimates his loss at about \$4,500, in goods consisting principally of valuable seal-skin sacks. The case containing the counting desk and partially concealed by it. Mr. George Reynolds, night watchman, states that when the gas was lighted in the alley after the moon went down, he noticed a back window open a few inches. He went to the District Telegraph Office and sent for Mr. Otto Earnst, the clerk who keeps the keys of the store. Mr. Earnst sent back word that it was all right, so Reynolds paid no further attention to it. This morning, however, when the store was opened, the loss was discovered. Reynolds, who has been a night watchman in Burkhardt's locality for twenty-two years, says that often the lamps are not lit until long after the light of the moon is entirely faded away, and it would be so dark in the alley that he could see but a few feet in front of him.

James Cooper, burglary. The Grand Jury in their final report stated that they were in session 17 days, examined 350 witnesses in 91 cases, and returned 31 indictments. They visited Longview Asylum and found it in good condition and under judicious management. They recommended the gas works there to be rebuilt. The other county institutions were also in good condition. The mode of heating the City Infirmary was reported. The jury spoke well of the Cincinnati Hospital.

CRUSAID AT FREDERICKTOWN.

NEWARK, O., Oct. 27.—Fredericktown is a village of 700 inhabitants, in Knox County, about seven miles from Mt. Vernon. Saturday the women of that place assembled as the ringing of a bell, and marched in a body to the saloon of Ed. Randall, broke open the door and windows, turned out his liquors, broke his demijohns and bar fixtures and completely gutted the place. Then they went over to O'Connor's Hotel, where a saloon was kept, and commenced a like proceeding, but O'Connor saved his liquors by agreeing to remove them from town. Randall swore out warrants, which are to be served today.

BODY OF BURR.

Forwarded To-day to St. Louis for Burial. Special to the Star. CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—The body of George Burr, the companion of Prof. Wise in the Pathfinder, was yesterday at Undertaker Jordan's, preparatory to being sent home to St. Louis today. The body is in a remarkably good state of preservation, considering that death must have ensued three weeks ago. The discovery of the body was made by a fisherman who was walking along the beach, the identification being made by the clothing and jewelry of the ill-fated adventurer. The gold cuff-buttons bore the letter B in bas relief, and on his collar-button were engraved the letters G. B. His clothing was also found to be marked with his name. \$30 was found in his pocket. The beach was searched for several miles on each side of where the remains were found, but nothing further was discovered. The opinion of some is that Prof. Wise escaped the watery grave vouchsafed his helpless companion, and that he met a worse fate in the forests of Michigan.

DIED SUDDENLY.

Mr. John Jacob Waffenschmidt, the well known druggist at the northwest corner of Twelfth and Elm streets, died very suddenly yesterday afternoon. Complaining of being ill he lay down on bed, and an hour afterwards was found dead by his wife. Coroner Carrick was summoned and found that Waffenschmidt died from acute apoplexy. No inquest was held.

KILLED IN A WRESTLING MATCH.

Saturday evening two colored men, Wm. Hickman, a native of Nashville, and Wm. Jackson, a steamboatman, engaged in a wrestling match in Barney Train's saloon, corner of Main and Water streets, which resulted in Jackson having his neck broken in the third bout. Hickman was arrested on the charge of manslaughter, and will be tried November 1st. Bail \$1,500. The coroner this afternoon rendered the following verdict in the Jackson case: "Death from dislocation of the cervical vertebrae and effusion of blood on the brain, caused by a fall while engaged in a friendly wrestling match. I further find that Wm. Hickman had no unfriendly feeling towards the deceased. He, therefore, cannot be held accountable for the fatal result."
