The SICKLES CASE.—The District At-
torney made a good impression in his opening
address. He apparently, however, thinks
that he took too much pains in discussing
the subject, and that his duty would have been
performed by a simple statement of
the facts of the killing, without having re-
ferred to any ornaments of eloquence. He
seemed to anticipate the theory of defense,
and strove to impress on the jury, that there
could be no legal justification of the act, and
if the justification to be set up was legal,
they must require it to be legally proven.
Mr. Ould is a fine, square built, athletic
man of some forty years of age. The defense,
however, seem to expect more difficulty from
his colleague, Mr. Cardine.
On Mr. Brady of N. Y., rests most of
the labor of the defense. He is studiously polite
