## THE MILITARY AND CIVIL PIC-NIC.—Our

reporter prepared himself yesterday-morning with pencils and paper, with the intention of accompanying the Grand Pic Nic of the Montgomery Guard to the noted ground where all the pic-nics go. He promised us a "glowing account" of the expedition; but he did not count the cost. "The Guard met at their Army about 8 o'clock, and after parading through some of our principal streets, (in which they did some light sojourn) they proceeded to the Xenia Depot. There they met a large and joyous crowd—the fair sex predominating, happily—and were awaiting the starting of the train, and who seemed "eager for the fray." At about 9 o'clock train started with one of the gayest and most enthusiastic parties we ever saw start on a pleasure excursion.
