ROBERT SUGAR AND SYRUP.—If the farmers who planted sugar cane this year, would use a little caution in making their syrup, they would be amply repaid for their trouble.

The complaint that sugar cannot be made of Saragum cane, and that the syrup and molasses has a peculiar sharp taste and is of an inferior quality, would not be heard again.

The whole secret consists in two points—in adding to the juice, sulphate of lime in solution, and filtering the boiled juice through animal coal.

The sulphate of lime must be added to the juice immediately after it is pressed out, one quart to one hundred quarts of the juice.

Its action consists in precipitating the albuminous matter, and in preventing the formation of an acid which prevents the crystallization of the sugar, and gives them the known peculiar sharp taste.

The animal coal takes away the nauseating smell and color. The filtering may be performed in a keg or barrel which has two bottom holes, which serve to support the coal and transmit the discolored syrup.

The last quantity of sugar may be washed out with water.
