## DAILY EMPIRE.

**THE DYING NEVER WEPT.**  
It is said the dying never wept.  
It is because the child of death  
insults the mother when she is in  
the arms of the angel of death.  
It cannot be—she calls for friends!  
Ask by a father to be proud,  
And long to lay the drooping brow  
Upon a mother's breast.

**Why do the dying never weep?**  
O, they have reached their point of Time  
That is for aught like earthly fears,  
With every pang of agony, they feel  
Their spirit ebb away as surely mark;  
And on their face the Future's sea  
Already through the shadows wait  
The voices of Eternity!

**O, why, why should the dying weep?**  
Weep with such angel thrills around?  
Weep when their brows shall be on a son  
With the immortal crown?  
It is the living that we should weep—  
The living yet to wear their chains—  
Not the dying, with that call  
To God's eternal plains.

**Cincinnati Correspondence.**  
CINCINNATI, Oct. 1, 1893.  
It was predicted last Spring that money  
would become plentiful as soon as we could  
have a good crop. Accounts from all parts  
of the country represent the wheat, oats,  
barley and corn crops to be above the aver-  
age. Wheat and corn has been, it is true,  
injured greatly by the frost in some localities,  
but it is admitted that there is a large  
surplus. The staples of the South, cotton  
and sugar, also promise well; still money is  
scarce and some pretend to say that it is  
scarcer than ever.

The cause of this scarcity does not seem  
to be understood. Young America lives as  
fast as ever, and boasts of the vast resources  
of our country. He says that we have the  
best and greatest variety of climate and soil  
the largest prairies, forests, lakes, rivers,  
mines of gold, silver, lead, coal, iron,  
and other minerals, in the world; that no na-  
tion ever before made such rapid progress in  
civilization, wealth and population. He  
points exultingly to our large cities, churches,  
colleges, school houses, store houses, hot-  
els, dwelling houses, and other improve-  
ments in proof of this. He justly feels  
proud of the noble and heroic deeds of  
Washington, Franklin, Jefferson, Madison,  
Monroe, Benton, Scott, Clay, Calhoun, Wel-  
sh and others, and asks: What country ever  
produced such mighty men and vast improve-  
ments in so short a space of time? Young  
America inheriting freedom and a large es-  
tate from his ancestors, thinks that "Uncle  
Sam is rich enough to give us all a farm."

He appears perfectly happy so long as he  
has the means to eat, drink, and be merry,  
and says that this cry of hard times is con-  
fined to the laboring classes who are never  
satisfied. In this Young America is greatly  
mistaken. One reason why currency is so  
scarce is that exchange is against us, and is  
likely to be so as long as Young America  
wears costly foreign fabrics, drinks liquors,  
smokes cigars, and makes use of other ar-  
ticles that he had better dispense with. The  
banks cannot safely issue more paper than  
coin in their vaults to redeem it with. The  
increased demand for coin in France and  
England is draining our country of the pre-  
cious metals, and the facilities afforded  
by rail roads for "shorters" to return every  
dollar of our paper currency for redemption  
in a very short time. This is now being done.  
The products of our hardy California miners  
have all been shipped to Europe, and about  
\$20,000,000 besides, to pay our foreign in-  
debtedness. This indebtedness has been in-  
creased by railroads, and the extravagance  
of Young America, who thinks there is no  
end to our wealth, and homeless resources.

He has been spoiled by coming into posses-  
sion of too large an estate. He has lived,  
and is living too fast—far beyond his in-  
come, and it is high time for him to give up his  
foreign luxuries, and husband his resources, or  
he will become a bankrupt, and end his  
days in a poor house.

California gold has enabled us to build  
railroads and improve our country, but our  
foreign debt is also increased, and it must  
be paid. Young America had better rely  
more upon the labor of his own hands, on  
our farms, in our workshops, in our manu-  
factories, and in our iron mines, and less  
upon the gold of California, for our national  
prosperity. He must become a producer as  
well as a consumer, and consume less than  
he produces if he expects to pay his honest  
debts, and hand down to posterity, unim-  
paired, the estate which he inherited from  
his noble ancestors.

It is true that we can boast of having the  
largest public domain; the most productive  
soil, the richest mines; the largest rivers and  
lakes, and a variety of climate that produces  
all the grains, fruits, and vegetables of  
the Northern as well as Southern latitudes,  
but the resources of all these may be squan-  
dered by paying tribute to foreign countries,  
and we now begin to feel the effects of  
Young America's extravagance. It is time  
that we become more self-reliant, more in-  
dustrious and economical, and less depend-  
ent upon foreigners and foreign productions,  
or it will shortly require the aid of our  
great resources to pay the interest on our  
foreign debt.
