The State Department has issued the following: DEPARTMENT OF STATE, WASHINGTON, Nov. 10, 1899.

Information has been received at this Department from an official source, that certain individuals, named in the United States of America, issued to unauthorized or unqualified individuals, do not confer the right of entrance into Prussia, nor through Prussia into Germany, nor even with the views of Ministers or Consuls would they have any validity as passports. CABBAGE FOR WINTER.

CABBAGE FOR WINTER.—We have several times already referred to our mode of having green cabbage all winter. Indeed, it is the best and most profitable. We repeat it again, as the season approaches in which it is "put up." It is the Dig shallow trenches in a dry part of the garden, say 2 feet apart, in which plant the cabbages, (which must be carefully taken from their beds with all the roots pretty closely, then erect over them a low scaffolding of poles, being 2 feet from the ground; let it be 4 feet higher in the middle, to carry off the water, and cover with straw or corn fodder, but down. This costs little labor or skill, and will give you cabbage through the winter and spring, about as fresh as in October.

A NOVEL WORK.—A considerable piece of work has just been completed in Southern France. It is the excavation of a subterranean communication from the lake Blen, a beautiful little sheet of water, the charm of that fashionable watering place, to the river Adour. The lake has an area of only 120 acres, but it is 7,000 feet above the sea, and it is estimated that a stratum of 70 feet may be taken during the summer months for the purpose of irrigation along the banks of the Adour. The tunnel was run under the bottom of the lake, and up to within a few yards of the shore, where a large room was excavated, into which communication was made by submarine blasting, charges of from 50 to 120 pounds being let down to the bottom of the lake.

HINTS TO THE FARMER.—The white-washing of cattle and horse stalls as well as the inside of hog-pens and henhouses, not only renders them more healthy, but prevents the animals and fowls from being infested with troublesome and filthy vermin. Keep your stables and barns well littered. Leave from the woods are excellent and absorb the liquid manure well, besides of themselves being a good manure. Nothing that will make good manure should be wasted, but carefully saved. Never undertake to feed an animal until you have first made it comfortable in bed and holed. If you wonder why other people's cattle are gentle, try the disinfecting treatment on yours, and you will soon learn the secret.
