CHASE'S STATE AUDITOR AND ATTORNEY GENERAL SWearing Opposite!

There is a queer state of affairs at Columbus just now—there is! In commencing his suit for the recovery of the \$549,000 that "came up missing" from the Treasury on the 10th day of June, 1857, the Attorney General, with his unsavoury good sense, made and filed in Court his affidavit that the money was lost or taken from the State Treasury during Gilson's term of office.

In the face of this affidavit, the Auditor of State prevailed on himself to take an oath that the same \$549,000 herein referred to was lost during Breslin's term of office and that it was never paid over to Gilson! On the strength of this latter affidavit, suit has been commenced against Breslin as well as Gilson, although the Attorney General shows by his affidavit that he believes the loss is wholly chargeable to the latter. The affidavit which Chase's Auditor has made, is rendered the more remarkable by the fact, that in December last, that officer stated in his regular annual report to the Governor, (page 15) that the money now missing, was in the State Treasury on the 15th of November, and that he saw it and counted it there at that time!

The making an affidavit such that the Auditor has furnished as the basis for suit against Breslin, shows the extremity to which the State officials feel themselves driven. The Attorney General (though a Republican) had too much sense to put himself in the fix that the Auditor has got into. It will do very well for political purposes to sue Breslin for the \$549,000. But there is just as much chance of getting a judgment for that sum against the man in the mood as against Breslin. It is all proper that he should be held to whatever liability the facts and the law will attach to him in consequence of his failure to pay over to his successor the \$203,000 swamped in broken banks. But the effort of the Auditor to swear the whole loss of \$750,000 on Breslin, is an act of foolishness of which a man of ordinary common sense ought not to have been guilty. Newark Advocate.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, Three-fifths of the members elected to each House concurring therein, That it be and hereby is proposed to the electors of the State to vote on the second Tuesday of October next, upon the approval or rejection of the following amendments to the Constitution of the State:

AMENDMENT NO. 1.
Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, Three-fifths of the members elected to each House concurring therein, That it be and hereby is proposed to the electors of the State to vote on the second Tuesday of October next, upon the approval or rejection of the following amendments to the Constitution of the State:
Section of the second Article of the Constitution and for the second Section of the same Article, shall commence on the first day of January annually. Senators shall be elected biennially, and Representatives annually, by the electors of their respective counties or districts on the second Tuesday of October. Their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and that of Senators shall continue two years, and that of Representatives elected at the same time shall hold their offices for one year. From and after the expiration of the term of office of any Senator or Representative, the electors of the county or district in which he or she shall hold their office for only one year, and their successors shall be elected on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and biennially thereafter. When any county shall have a fraction above the rate for one representative so large that being multiplied by ten, the result shall be equal to one or more additional representatives, such shall be added to the number of representatives of the county for the next session of the decennial period.

AMENDMENT NO. 2.
Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, Three-fifths of the members elected to each House concurring therein, That it be and hereby is proposed to the electors of the State to vote on the second Tuesday of October next, upon the approval or rejection of the following amendments to the Constitution of the State:
Section 2. District Courts shall be held in each county at least once each year, by one or more Justices of the Peace, to be appointed by the electors of the county, and their terms of office shall be for two years, and they shall be eligible for re-election. The electors of each county shall be divided into as many districts as there are Justices of the Peace to be appointed, and each district shall elect one Justice of the Peace. AMENDMENT NO. 3.
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Section 1. The General Assembly shall be composed of Senators and Representatives, and shall meet on the second Tuesday of October next, and thereafter on the second Tuesday of October in every second year. The electors of each county shall elect one Senator and one Representative, and the electors of each township shall elect one Representative. The electors of each county shall be divided into as many districts as there are Senators to be elected, and each district shall elect one Senator.
