

California Items  
The steamer Crescent City left Aspinwall on the evening of the 12th, and arrived in New York on Friday. The Panama papers are filled with news of horrible murders and diabolical robberies. Aside from these chronicles of human depravity, there is nothing peculiarly interesting.

A young lady 20 years of age, named Senorita Aparilla, has been admitted into the sisterhood of nuns of Panama. The ceremony took place on the 3d, and was conducted with much religious pomp. The lady makes the fourth new in the order, and as the other three are long advanced in age, it is probable that she will be the last to be admitted. She is a native of Panama, and is the daughter of a wealthy merchant.

There is a proposition in the columns of the Panama Star, to remedy the scarcity of water in that city by boring an Artesian well in the cathedral. The water obtained from most of the wells, (which are about 40 feet deep,) is brackish and disagreeable, but with a well 600 feet in depth, the Star has no doubt good water may be obtained.

The line of steamers between Aspinwall and Havana has been discontinued.  
The steamship Independence on her passage up to San Francisco, ran ashore near the Margarita Islands, and finally swung round with her side to the beach, when she careened over, took fire and was entirely consumed.— There was nearly five hundred passengers aboard, of whom, in their endeavors to get ashore by swimming and otherwise, about 140 were drowned.

The passengers saved, numbering in all about 270, were cast upon a barren, uninhabited island, without water or any other means of subsistence, where they remained five days and six hours, during which time they suffered dreadfully. Finally, by firing cannon, they attracted the attention of some whaling vessels which came to their assistance with provisions, and took all the survivors off the island.

Vestras, all from Illinois; Jas. Fallon, St. Louis; Benj. Ward, Michigan; Asa Watson and son, St. Louis; B. M. Waddell, H. J. Roberts, and Mrs. Howland and her three sons, Wisconsin; Mrs. E. Brown, Iowa; and Mrs. Hall and child, Illinois.

The whole number of the lost is one hundred and forty, and of the saved, three hundred.

By this arrival we have dates from San Francisco.
