BANCROFT CORRECTING JUDGE TANEY.—The N. Y. Evening Post calls attention to the following passage in Bancroft's last volume. As he is a much higher authority in history than Judge Taney, we may learn from it what a slender foundation the Dred Scott opinion has to stand upon. The passage occurs in his account of the battle of Banker Hill. "For should history forget to record that, in the army of Cambridge, so also in this gallant band, the free negroes of the colony had their representatives. For the right of the free negroes to bear arms in the public defence, was at that day, [1778] as little disputed in New England as their other rights. They took their place, not in a separate corps, but in the ranks with the white men, and their names may be read on the pension rolls of the country, side by side with those of other soldiers of the Revolution."—[Vol. VII, Ch XXXIX, page 421.
