Novels, Tales, Biography, Voyages, Travels, and the News of the Day.—It was one of the greatest objects of 'Waldie's Library' to make good reading cheaper, and to bring literature to every man's door. That object has been accomplished; we have given to books wings, and they have flown to the uttermost parts of our vast continent, carrying security to the secluded, occupation to the literary, information to all.
