

Farmers, Look Here!

He manufactures **Ball & Post's CULTIVATOR**,
 a new article patented April 6th, 1852, to which he
 would call the attention of agriculturists. As a la-
 bor saving machine, it is capable of doing double
 the amount of work of any ordinary Cultivator.—
 This implement has two long shares, one on each
 side, constructed of steel, and fastened on the mould
 boards in such a manner as to move the entire sur-
 face of the ground, thereby cutting all roots and
 weeds that come in contact with the shares which
 may be graduated by the clevis to run from two to
 six inches in depth.

The three small plows attached to the shares an-
 swer the same purpose of the common tooth culti-
 vator, and in addition to the shares and plows, is a
 metallic blade rake attached to the rear of the Cul-
 tivator, which serves to cut and break up the sod
 and hard lumps, leaving the earth in a fine and pul-
 verized condition. The effectiveness of this cultiva-
 tor renders second hoeing unnecessary, which is a
 saving of time and labor.

Mr. Perrin also manufactures a larger sized ma-
 chine, constructed upon the same principle as the
 above, but with larger shares, and containing two
 small plows in addition to the corn cultivator, which
 is designed to put in grain, and working upon sum-
 mer fallows. They are light, and of durable con-
 struction, readily handled and of easy draught.
