

The "Wool" Trade.—A Customer.

A correspondent at Port Clinton writes us that an "individual" calling himself Newton,—professing to belong to the firm of Newton & Brother at Utica, N. Y., and which he represents as a heavy Wool House,—has paid Ottawa county a visit and has succeeded in "pulling the wool over the eyes" of some of its good people. Professing to have been enamored of the fine fleeces of Ottawa, our correspondent goes on to say, he suggested that it was his desire to establish an agency for its purchase and to leave some \$10,000 or \$15,000 in Port Clinton for that purpose. After making considerable noise, he so far won the confidence of our friend — that the latter reluctantly consented to take the agency and the \$15,000, together with a handsome salary, &c. This "heavy Dealer" had been so unfortunate, in traveling, as to lose his trunk in which he kept his best rig; consequently his toggery presented a rather shabby appearance. It was therefore convenient to open an account with his "Agent" for divers little fixings in his line,—in fact making it as large as prudence would allow him to urge the matter; when, we are informed he was seized with the disease prevailing to a considerable extent in some parts of Ottawa county, but instead of "shaking himself out of his boots," he shook himself out of town. This "confidence" gentleman is thus described: He is about 28 or 30 years old, of robust appearance, dark complexion and wore away a new "Merino" hat, new boots, black frock coat, rather seedv. Not having succeeded in gaining the affections of Capt. B—, with whom he domiciled while Port Clinton was enlivened by his presence, we are told he departed minus his overcoat. Those who may be the subjects of Mr. Newton's future financial operations at the West, would do well to remember the above description and remember that "all that glitters is not gold." If all that is said is true, the same gentleman has hitherto succeeded in "fleecing" sundry parties in Lorain county, and visited Sandusky some year or two ago, but without much success. I regret that Dr. Olds of Ohio, has not yet satisfactorily explained the suspicious circumstance of the appointment of Marcus L. Olds to be register of the Minnesota Land Office. This appointment was confirmed May 19, and the Doctor gave the final vote on the Nebraska Bill on the 22d. Some persons persist in asserting that there was the same connection between these circumstances as between cause and effect. It is an interesting fact, in connection with these occurrences, that on the 24th of January last, Dr. Olds called a meeting of the democrats of the Ohio delegation, to denounce the Nebraska bill. Nine gentlemen attended, and it was resolved to issue an address to the democracy, in reprobation of the whole scheme. The meeting was adjourned to a day certain, but in the mean time the Doctor's mind experienced a change. Nobody would insinuate that improper motives had been insinuated into it, but it is certain that the Doctor voted for Nebraska, and that about the same time his son received an appointment, salary and emoluments \$3,000 per annum.

Mr. Green was a zealous assistant at this original Olds anti Nebraska meeting. Mr. Green voted for Nebraska. A proposition is pending for dividing Ohio into two judicial districts. The clerkship of the additional District Court will be worth five thousand dollars a year. It will be well enough to observe whether that place is given to a Nebraska member of Congress.—[N. Y.
