Perryburg Journal.

How the Star of the West was Stolen.
Quartermaster McGrath, with nine others of the crew of the Star of the West, who were on board of her at the time of her capture, have reached New York. He says she started from New York on the 12th of March, as a troopship, to transport U. S. troops from Texas to a Northern port. On the 26th, they arrived at Brazos San Jago, where there were piles of shot and shell, several large field pieces mounted, and ammunition wagons standing about, which had been stolen from the U. S. Government. On 20th received orders from the U. S. commanding officer at Indianola to proceed to that place. On 12th of April they were ordered to proceed to Brazos San Jago, and to transport the troops that were encamped on the Mexican frontier to Indianola, but on arriving there they found the troops embarked on a Texas steamer. On the 13th they went to Indianola, where they imagined themselves as safe as though they were in New York harbor. On the 17th they were visited by the pilot, who desired them to be ready to receive troops at any hour, day or night. He said they were to arrive in the steamer Fashion, and were then thirty miles distant. About five o'clock in the morning they received a warning from a Galveston steamer, in which were reported the fall of Fort Sumter, and the proclamation of the President. The usual routine of business went on in preparing the vessel for sea, none of them suspecting the rascally trick which was preparing for their capture.
At five minutes after twelve, midnight, of the 17th, a steamer hailed the watch on deck, and said they had three hundred and odd troops for them, and their baggage would come by another steamer. All hands assented to get the troops on board. They gave the troops all manner of assistance to get on board, and when they were nearly all aboard they found that they were Texas rebels instead of U. S. troops. Capt. Howes cried, "My God! I have lost my ship!" A person stepped up to him and said, "I am Captain Van Dorn. I command here. This ship is prize to the Confederate States." It seems that Van Dorn was sent from Montgomery to Galveston on the 12th of April to raise troops to capture the vessel.
Mr. McGrath says that two colored men who were servants or assistant stewards in the ship, were captured with the vessel. Their names are Levi Man, aged about fifty years, who has a wife and family in New York, and Walter Good-year, aged about 30, who has a wife and family in New York. These two colored men were taken to prison and afterwards sold into slavery.
The Confederate sounders were anxious to get McGrath to join them, and told him if he would get him the position of boatswain's mate if he would do so. He is an Irishman, but would not fight against his adopted country.

Patriotic Address of General Hartrey.

St. Louis, May 14.—General Hartrey published this morning an address to the people of Missouri, in which he calls attention to the military bill recently passed by the Legislature, and says that it is unconstitutional, and ought not to be upheld by the good citizens of Missouri. He says, "With every man the termination of the present condition of things in respect to the cotton States, Missouri must share the destiny of the Union. All her material interests point to this result, and so important is this regarded to the great opinion of the U. S. Government, if necessary, will be exerted to retain Missouri in the Union."
Spang of Camp Jackson, he says, "the names of 'Davis' and 'Beauregard' marked its main avenues; that a body of men organized in the interests of the secessionists have been received there openly leaving the dress and badge distinguishing the army of the so-called Southern Confederacy, and leaves the people to draw their own inferences of the character and ultimate purpose of the 'empire.' He states, however, that there are many good and loyal men in the camp who were in no manner responsible for its reasonable character."
In conclusion, he says, "Disclaiming all desire or intention to interfere with the prerogatives of the State of Missouri, or with the functions of a Executive, yet I regard it my plain path of duty to express to the people in respectful but decided language that within the field or scope of my command the supreme law of the land must and shall be maintained, and no subversive whatever, whether in forms of legislative acts or otherwise, can be permitted to harass or oppress the good, law-abiding people of Missouri. I shall exert my authority to protect their persons and property from violations of every kind and shall deem it my duty to suppress all unlawful combinations of men, whether formed under a military organization or otherwise."
He says Floyd has turned up again. He offers a brigade from southwestern Virginia, to assist in completing the work of destroying the government, which he commenced as Secretary of War.
The Cleveland Leader of Friday says a dispatch from Columbus, received by the contractor for supplies at Camp Taylor, says positively that the price must be reduced from 50 to 30 cents per man per day.
There is a private in the Rhode Island Regiment at Washington, who is worth half a million of dollars. A Washington correspondent states that he saw him Wednesday, mopping the floor of the barracks.
The Southern Congress has passed an act declaring war against the United States government and making provision for pirating upon the commerce of the nation. Thirty days are allowed Northern ships to clear from Southern ports.
A gentleman, just arrived at Pittsburg from Jacksonville, Fla., reports the people of the latter place as strongly Unionist. They have reason to be, as their chief support has been derived from the Northern invaders who resorted there.
Col. Edsworth got rid of his disorderly volunteers by simply expelling them from the regiment and turning them over to the civil authorities. Of the six who declined to enlist for the war, four were killed and the others are willing to serve three months.
Mr. Davis, who bore so prominent and honorable a part in the defense of Fort Sumter, is at Indianapolis, and will take charge of the Commissary and Quartermaster's Departments connected with the regiments now mustered in the Government service from that State.
New Hampshire has raised two regiments. Their officers have been selected equally from the R-publican and Democratic party. Hon. Mason W. Tappan, late member of Congress, is Colonel of the first Regiment, and Thos. P. Pierce of Manchester, Colonel of the 2d.
Mr. Peter Hart, the gallant New York policeman who distinguished himself so nobly during the bombardment of Fort Sumter, by sailing the Stars and Stripes to the flagstaff in the midst of the hottest fire, is about to receive a handsome commission at the hands of his superior officers.
Nine Regiments of Infantry will be received from Ohio under the new call of the President for seventy five Regiments of Infantry. These Regiments will serve for three years, and will be the men raised by the Government to defend the enemy. A Regiment of Cavalry will also be received, but it has not been assigned.
Secretary Chase has ordered the stoppage of all kinds of supplies passing Cairo for the rebellious States, which class may now be said to include all the Southern States below that point, except Kentucky. The steps just taken by Arkansas and Tennessee will give increased interest to all movements on the Mississippi, and render an attack upon Cairo more probable.
Boston furnished the first complete Regiment under the President's call for three months volunteers, and now she leads again in offering the first Regiment for the full term of three years. It makes little difference with the gallant friends of Freedom in old Massachusetts what duty the government requires for its defense, they are on hands every time. No wonder the secessionists want to get rid of such men.
The Cleveland Plain Dealer puts its position thus:
It is needless for us to say that in this controversy the Plain Dealer is with the through R-publicans. How old Hickory would look at the head of the American Army on its way to defend the National Capital from invasion, going round a city of rebels because he dare not go through it. Bah!

A Horse for Gen. McClelland.
The Cincinnati Press says a number of gentlemen connected with the rail roads which enter that city, have presented their friend and associate, Gen. Geo. McClelland, a splendid bright bay horse, somewhat dappled, with black mane and tail, lofty clean-lined and powerful. He was purchased in St. Louis, cost \$400, is said to be perfectly broken, and stands music and fire. It is an appropriate gift, most worthily bestowed.

Appeal to the People of Ohio.

The gallant defenders of the Constitution and the Union in St. Louis, have raised four regiments of volunteers in response to the call of the President of the United States for 75 regiments of volunteers, and enforces the laws. The Governor and authorities of Missouri, refuse all aid to these noble men. In their necessities they appeal to the friends of the Union in the loyal States, for means to sustain them till the General Government can come to their aid. I appeal, and ask for the earnest consideration of the people of Ohio. Not an hour should be lost. With St. Louis in the firm grasp of the friends of our Government, the traitors who seek to betray Missouri to the Southern Confederacy cannot prevail.
In behalf of these brave defenders of the right, who are rejected by the State authorities who ought to protect them, I appeal to you for help. Let the contributions be liberal and immediate. If no hour, or better way of transmission is practicable, I will receive and forward all funds directed to me for that purpose.

The Minié Rifle.

The first rifle in vogue in France was the so called pillar rifle of Thouvenin, but the invention of Mr. Minié is one which has practically revolutionized the fire arms of the present day. The improvements made by Mr. Minié are confined almost wholly to the form of the projectile, and have very little reference to that of the gun out of which it is fired. The ball is of an oblong conical form, something like an acorn without its cup; but instead of being solid, this cone is hollowed out at the base into a cup-like form. The advantages of this form of projectile are that it offers less resistance to the air than a round ball would, and that having its center of gravity in its foremost part, it has no tendency to turn over in its flight; but its chief merit, in a military point of view, is that with it the rifle can be loaded as easily as the ordinary smooth-bored gun, the forcing of the ball into the grooves of the barrel being effected by the gaspowder and not by the ramrod. The form of the rifle proper to these conical missiles differs very little from those used with those used with the old spherical bullet, except that a three-grooved gun, and it is still an unsettled question whether four grooves would be better than three. With this weapon the soldier can make better practice at five hundred, or even one thousand yards, than he could with the old musket at one or two hundred yards.

Let Justice be Done.

Under the last Administration, as will be remembered, Capt. Gardner who was in command at Fort Moultrie, was removed, and Major Anderson appointed to that post. It was said at the time that Capt. Gardner was suspected of not being true to the Government, hence the change. We are glad to see that this charge of disaffection is contradicted, and that his removal was effected by the then Secretary of War, Floyd, in the hope of finding in Major Anderson a more pliant instrument for his treacherous purpose. The Rochester Union publishes a statement which says that before he was transferred from Fort Moultrie, Capt. Gardner repeatedly called on Floyd for more men and provisions, but could not get them. Instead, and in payment of workmen were sent, ostensibly to repair Fort Sumter, but really to weaken it. Capt. Gardner meanwhile managed to get six months provisions thrown into the Fort without Floyd's knowledge, through the influence of Commissary-General Taylor, and the Secretary of War, finding how impracticable a man he had placed in charge of the Fort, ordered him away, and sent Anderson in his place, whose sympathies with the South he considered sufficiently strong to make the surrender for a demand inevitable. How Floyd miscalculated events have shown; but for the ability to hold out so long, Anderson was indebted to the franchise practiced by Gardner.
