

From Washington.

WASHINGTON, August 1. Mr. Bates declines a Cabinet appointment, preferring the chance of coming to the Senate from Mo. This leaves two vacancies, and Gov. Jones, of Tenn., Conrad, of La., and others, are mentioned to fill them.

It is supposed the California bill will pass the Senate without much difficulty, but as the cholera is approaching by way of Harper's Ferry, it may hurry an adjournment. The question is full of distrust and danger. Notwithstanding the belief that the separate bill will be passed, the debate to-day was strong on the prospect of Civil War. Much complaint is made against Mr. Pearce for defeating the Compromise bill. He was warned that his proposition if carried would defeat it, but he persisted, and death to the Compromise is the consequence. Feelings of exasperation are now engendered which will ferment and cannot be allayed.

The California bill may pass the Senate, but it cannot go through the House this session. It is said that Mr. Pearce's motion, which defeated the bill, resulted from a visit to President Fillmore yesterday morning. He disapproved of the Texas arrangement.

Mr. Clay will leave here on Saturday. Southern members are determined to resist the admission of California, and will stick out to the last against it.

TO BRING THE DROWNED TO LIFE.—At this season of the year, when so many fatal accidents are occurring, the following advice, which we have, perhaps, before published, is particularly opportune: "Immediately as the body is removed from the water, press the chest suddenly and forcibly downward and backward, and instantly discontinue the pressure. Repeat this violent interruption until a pair of bellows can be procured. When obtained, introduce the muzzle well upon the base of the tongue. Surround the mouth with a towel or handkerchief, and close it. Direct a bystander to press firmly upon the projecting part of the neck (Adam's apple) and use the bellows actively. Then press upon the chest to expel the air from the lungs, to imitate the natural breathing.—Continue this at least an hour, or until signs of natural breathing come on.

Wrap the body in blankets, place it near a fire, and do every thing to preserve the natural warmth, as well as to impart an artificial heat, if possible. Every thing, however, is secondary to inflating the lungs. Send for a medical man immediately. Avoid all friction until respiration shall be in some degree restored. VAL. MOTT.

The Portuguese Claims.

Among the claims against Portugal made by our government, is one for the privateer General Armstrong, captured at Fayal, by the British, in 1814. The event made a great noise at the time, the defence having been heroic to the last degree. The Armstrong was lying in that port, when a British cruiser, accompanied by a frigate, entered the harbor, and the same night endeavored to cut her out; but the boats were repelled by the privateer's crew. Another attack was made at midnight; no less than fourteen launches participated in it; but this was also repelled, the British losing three boats, in one of which were fifty men, of whom but a single one was saved. In all the enemy lost 120 killed. The next morning, despairing of further defence, for the British now hauled one of their ships up close to the Armstrong, the Americans abandoned their brig, when the foe burned her. As all this took place within half a cable's length of the Portuguese fort, the claim for indemnification is just, as the authorities at Fayal ought to have protected the Armstrong.—Lancasterian.

SOMETHING NEW.—An ingenious Yankee down east has invented a machine for milking cows. The editor of the Maine Farmer has seen it, and given it a trial. He says it empties the udder very freely and easily, and at the rate of about a quart per minute.

Review of the Portsmouth market, for the week ending August 5, 1850.

GENERAL REMARKS.—As was noted last week, business has materially improved in the last ten days, and our friends from the country are coming in to make their purchases. Recent rains have purified the air & we may reasonably expect an abatement of sickness throughout the whole country. On a recent examination through our market, we find it well supplied with the leading articles of trade, and as a heavy fall business is anticipated, active preparations are making to meet it, by the erection of two extensive blocks of stores, one above Market and the other on the corner of Front and Jefferson. The following transactions of our market are referred to.

WHEAT AND GRAIN.—Our market is now well supplied with flour, both of home make and foreign brands. Sales of both have averaged \$4.25, but the market is heavy at the close. Wheat brings 80 cts. for prime qualities, 75 for common, and hulk arriving. Sales of Oats at 35 cents, supply scant.

SUGAR AND MOLASSES.—The quotation for sugar and molasses remains as last week. A sale of 10 hds at p. n. t. is reported. 64, 64 and 7 are the average sales. Molasses is held at 34c35. Sugar house 43c45c.

COFFEE.—There is much firmness by holders of Coffee. Sales at 10c11.

BACON.—There has been but little enquiry for bacon for three or four weeks, as the consumption is lessened always in July and August. There is no change in prices to note.

CHEESE.—Our market is nearly bare of a good article. The last shipments have been of inferior quality. Sales at 6c.

RICE.—A slight advance is noted. Sales at 55c.

WHISKEY.—Demand limited, and a slight concession in prices from last week. Sales at 91 to 92c.

FAMILY MARKETS.—The attendance of wagons from the country has increased materially during the last week. Saturday's market was very respectable. For the satisfaction of our lady readers, we note that good butter is 15c per lb, chickens 30c per pair. Potatoes 16 cents per peck, tomatoes at prices to suit, berries at 4 to 5 cents per quart.
